Tar Sands Crude -- A Toxic Threat to Texas?

TransCanada's proposed Keystone XL project is designed to carry unrefined tar sands oil 1700 miles from Alberta, Canada southward through several states including Texas to be refined and shipped from Port Arthur. Tar sand crude threatens landowners and waterways throughout the US as it is highly corrosive and acidic compared to Texas crude. Tar sands represent an unstable blend of bitumen (which looks like asphalt) which needs to be liquified with natural gas and other chemicals, which is then highly pressurized to travel through a single wall pipeline.

Currently, the US has NO guidelines for tar sands pipelines posing serious threats and damage to their communities and drinking water. In Texas alone, the pipeline crosses rivers and streams more than 32 times. The U.S. State Department is now under tremendous pressure to grant the pipeline's permit. Learn more about how this pipeline puts US taxpayers at risk while allowing Canada and foreign buyers of oil all the reward.

Northwest Earth Institute Discussion Courses

The Dallas Sierra Club is using environmental discussion curricula from the Northwest Earth Institute (<u>www.nwei.org</u>) for small group discussions, and we're looking for people interested in organizing groups. Most groups have 4-10 people, and usually meet once a week for 4 to 7 weeks. The format of these groups is like a book club -- everyone reads that week's chapter (about 1 hour of advance reading each week) and comes prepared to discuss it. Group members take turns facilitating the discussion using questions provided in the reading materials.

A discussion group is very easy to coordinate! No expertise is required, and you are not required to read the material in advance. I have taken several courses, and I will help you start a group. Here's what you need to do:

- 1. Read the course descriptions at http://www.nwei.org/discussion_courses and decide which one interests you. I have copies of some of the course books that I can loan if you want to review one.
- 2. Decide what part of town you want to meet in, and look for locations. Some groups meet in a person's home. Restaurants that have a quiet corner where people can hear each other are an option. Also consider libraries or other public buildings that have conference rooms. Choose the day and time, and get the facility manager's permission (if not a person's home).
- 3. Collect money/checks for the course books and send it to the Club treasurer.
- 4. Distribute the books to group members and have your meetings.

Although we'll promote the course through our website, emails, newsletter, and meeting announcements, we're happy for you to publicize it to your friends and colleagues as well.

Recent Recycling News - September 2011

Drop-Off Shredding

The Raccoon has a confession to make. She lets her shredding accumulate and accumulate until she has a pile of documents that will take forever to shred. One Friday afternoon, after having spent an hour, she barely made a dent in the stack. (In her defense, she had a bunch of old income tax and financial records to dispose of.)

Then came the light bulb moment! Surely other people have the same dreadful stacks of papers to be shredded. Surely there must be a place where you can drop off your documents. Maybe even watch them being shredded.

Thanks to the wonders of the internet, the Raccoon found a place that will take drop-off shredding and charge a mere pittance. You can watch your stuff being shredded! I can't name names because the Club does not endorse commercial ventures, but I'm sure your Google talents will soon find an appropriate place.

Now there are other options too - Bachman Transfer Station had a large bin with slots in it where you can drop off paper (checks/bank statements/love letters from old flames, etc.) to be shredded and recycled (it is at the Dry Gulch Recycling Station). Other City of Dallas transfer stations may have similar facilities. Also, many churches have free shred days.

Dallas to Accept Milk Cartons in Recycling Bins

The City of Dallas with the support of Greenstar North America and the Carton Council will host a press conference to introduce the addition of food and beverage cartons as new acceptable items in the city's highly successful curbside recycling program.

With this announcement, Dallas will be the first major city in Texas to include cartons in its curbside recycling program. Under the new initiative, residents will be able to place all empty cartons " such as milk and juice cartons, along with soup and broth, soy milk and wine cartons" in their blue recycling bins or community recycling drop off containers.

UNT Recycles 2011!

The University of North Texas (UNT) is recycling in a big way this year:

- More than 20,000 the cubic feet of landfill space saved by UNT's recycling efforts annually.
- More than 1,606,000 the gallons of water expected to be saved through UNT's recycling efforts this year.
- 2,180 the number of recycling receptacles available on the UNT main campus.
- UNT's new stadium features 21 luxury suites, 750 club seats, banquet space and a team spirit apparel store. The new stadium will also feature renewable energy by providing power through three 121 foot wind turbines with 30 foot long blades.

"We are the mean green and we mean green," Athletic director Rick Villarreal says. "Part of the process of building this stadium was identifying materials, the ways to chill different parts of the stadium by putting in turbines, different things that allowed us to reduce the amount of emissions that we use and the amount of water that we use."

"We recycle water out of the stadium to water outside the stadium in our grass areas and used non-toxic paints. As a university, they're very important to us."

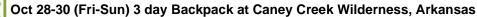
