Urban Wilderness: The Surprising Link Between Nature and Prosperity

Gary Olp, environmental architect, will discuss how the built environment has an effect on ourselves and all living organisms and systems, and will show examples of architecture that integrates buildings into the natural environment.

We are becoming more removed from a sense of reverence for the wild places. Every square inch of soil under our feet is a wild place, home to living organisms and a teeming unseen wilderness!

Human progress adversely impacts the natural world. While Green Building and Sustainable Building are focused on mitigating the adversity, they rarely succeed in harmonizing urban elements with the wilderness. There is a growing body of research that displays positive results for building environments that are integrated with the natural world that surrounds us. The sense of wonder and invigorating physical and emotional impact wild places have on each of us should guide our actions for growth and prosperity to preserve, restore, and embrace the life giving power of the wilderness.

Being aware that the entire surface of the earth is intrinsically linked to living natural systems that sustain all forms of life can produce human communities with reduced impact that are restorative rather then destructive.

Cedar Ridge Preserve

Cedar Ridge Preserve is a 600 acre natural area in southwest Dallas County on the Austin Chalk formation. This beloved preserve has 10 miles of hiking trails, ranging from easy to difficult. Audubon Dallas has been managing the Preserve for 10 years. With the help of many dedicated volunteers, the preserve has seen many improvements in the last few years. Construction and Demolition (C&D) Recycling

Recycling - Don't Forget Clothing Resale Stores!

Tired of your old wardrobe? Can't afford a \$60 blouse or \$120 skirt (as if any even wears one of those today!) Go resale shopping! You can get designer clothes at a fraction of the original cost. One estimate by America's Research Group, figures 12-15% of American consumers will shop in resale stores this year. And about 5% of annual resale growth wasn't just due to the sluggish economy, it was motivated by **environmental awareness**.

Its not just recession, its the recycling revolution. The green thing. People buy things the put it in their close and wear them three or four times and then its the fast fashion idea: We want to change out what we're wearing. And – let's face it – for some of us (you know who you are) it's **retail therapy**.

And drop your mental image of the Goodwill Store with hundreds of items packed on long racks. Today's retail store, like The Clothes Mentor, is more like a boutique. The store is lined with racks of fashionable clothes, rows of glamorous shoes, towers of costume jewelry and a wall covered floor to ceiling in purses. Stores like these are flourishing in the tight economy. The Clothes Mentor chain alone will open eight stores in north Texas this year.

Some resale stores have seen an 18% growth rate last year. That's not just recession. That's ladies looking for a bargain and putting together an outfit at a fair price.

Finally, don't put gently worn clothing into the trash! There are bins all over town for donations of clothing, shoes, and accessories. They can still be used and someone will appreciate it.

It's Time to DOO the Right Thing

The weather is warm, the flowers are in bloom, and the grass is green in North Texas. For many pet owners, this means extended walks with their dog. While enjoying this time with your pet, it is extremely important that you clean up after them whether it's at home or on a walk. Pet waste can cause many problems. Not only is it unsightly, it can harm the environment, pollute water, and cause disease.

Pet waste that is left on the ground can be carried away by stormwater runoff and deposited into nearby creeks and lakes. The water we recreate in and use as a drinking source becomes contaminated with the bacteria and any waterborne diseases the feces may harbor. These can cause illness and even death in humans and in other animals. With approximately 1.2 million dogs in the North Central Texas area, waste can quickly become a water quality and health concern.

Leaving pet waste on the ground can also affect your dog. For example, Parvovirus is a serious, highly contagious disease that affects puppies and young dogs who are not vaccinated. Adult dogs can be carriers and not show signs of being infected. It can be transmitted through infected dog waste directly or indirectly through soiled shoes, car tires, and anything else it touches. The virus can remain infectious on the ground for six months or even longer! For these reasons, it is essential to not leave pet waste on the ground. Keep people and pets safe and healthy by picking up after your dog. Here are some simple tips:

- When walking your dog, always carry a plastic baggie to scoop up droppings
- Dispose of baggies in the trash
- Clean up droppings around your yard at least once a week, and either flush them down the toilet, or dispose of in a trash can

Pledge to **DOO** the Right Thing and pick up after your dog.
