See *Yosemite Through the Eyes of a Buffalo Soldier*, a film featuring National Park Service Ranger Shelton Johnson as a 1903 Buffalo Soldier and his observations as one of the first "park rangers" to serve in Yosemite's vast wilderness. We see Yosemite through his eyes and feel his growing affection for this new world. The film blazes a trail to an important history that was nearly lost, and provides an opportunity to ride with the Buffalo Soldiers through the Range of Light.



This unique film by Emmy Award winning filmmaker Sterling Johnson provides a window to Yosemite's past, and was shot entirely in the Yosemite of today and yesterday. Jeff Southwick's musical compositions feature Shelton Johnson's spirited improvisations on Native American Flutes, providing a high note beneath which Southwick's lyrical explorations offer an inspired music score.

Texas Nature and Environmental Centers

Dan Moulton will highlight the distribution of Texas Environmental Centers, the types of programs that are offered, and descriptions of some of the more unusual Centers. He will talk about outdoor programs for people of all ages -- guided hikes and activities, summer camps, handicapped-accessible trails, outreach programs, family programs, and many more. Dan's presentation will be based on his *Texas Nature and Environmental Centers Guide*, which is an excellent resource for fighting "nature-deficit disorder" by facilitating visits to nature and environmental centers throughout Texas.

Daniel W. Moulton is a wildlife ecologist with a B.A. in biology, a M.S. in wildlife ecology, and a Ph.D. in wildlife science. He has worked for the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, the Maryland Wildlife Administration, and for over 20 years at the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. After retirement from TPWD, he taught for over six years as an adjunct professor of environmental science and biology at several colleges in the Dallas area.

Texas Legislature Passes HB 40 Threatening Dallas and N. Texas Drilling Ordinances

The Legislature is in it's final weeks and unfortunately bad bills have passed that threaten Dallas and other local ordinances in the N. Dallas area. One of the worst bills, HB 40, made final passage the Senate this week and will now head to Governor Abbott's desk.

Simply stated, the bill maintains that oil and gas operations are the exclusive jurisdiction of the state "preempting" all other political subdivisions. This new legislation threatens to not only gut a municipality's ability to retain, create, or enforce rules with oversight of oil and gas drilling, but also threatens the ability of counties, groundwater districts, or any political subdivision's ability to do so.

The bill is seen as an over-the-top reaction to the Denton fracking ban. The new legislation stacks the deck in favor of industry and places the burden upon cities to prove if their ordinance is "commercially reasonable."

About 60 municipalities currently have some form of a drilling ordinance limiting drilling or fracking. The new legislation will undo almost 100 years of local home-rule authority. For years, Texas courts have consistently recognized municipal authority to regulate oil and gas. The newly passed legislation will now tear down a long-standing tradition of shared authority between the state and cities inviting endless legal challenges with operators rather than providing clarity on what municipalities can regulate.

With the passage of HB 40, not only are setbacks and traffic regulations challenged, but also all subsurface ordinances are completely preempted. Many cities have regulations regarding whether deep injection wells can be located within city limits. Cities and counties may be preempted to regulate drilling and boring under roads if not deemed "commercially reasonable" by industry. Besides Texas, Oklahoma is now contemplating legislation similar to HB 40 to limit or ban a cities'

ability to devise ordinances to limit fracking or deal with concerns over water disposal, well maintenance and other activities. Colorado, Pennsylvania, Ohio, and New Mexico have also grappled with putting limits on local ordinances.

Southwest Texas Explorapalooza Trip - May 23-25

Come join us for a unique trip to the Llano River area that is unlike any of our usual bus trips! This Memorial Day Weekend we're going to enjoy Texas scenery at an easier pace, camping in a developed campground with running water and hot showers, or there's an option to stay in a motel nearby. There will be no backpacking, nor sleeping on a bus! We'll explore the Caverns of Sonora, learn about Texas history at Fort McKavett, float the South Llano River, and see one of the largest colonies of Mexican free-tailed bats emerge in the evening from Devil's Sink Hole. We've allotted time for exploring our home base of South Llano River State Park, which has excellent hiking, birding, and swimming opportunities.



We have 14 campsites reserved at the state park that are all in close proximity to running water bathrooms. If you'd prefer a bed, there's a room block reserved at the motel a few miles up the road where our bus driver will also be staying. We've chartered a new comfortable bus, so you don't have to worry about driving- just relax and enjoy the camaraderie. Our bus leaves early Saturday morning May 23rd arriving around lunch time at our first destination and returns to Dallas Monday evening May 25th after dinner, so you can get back refreshed and relaxed without using up your vacation time!

July Backpacking Adventures in Colorado's San Juan Mountain Range

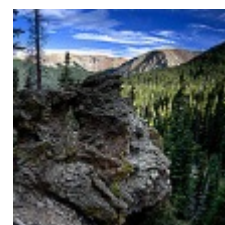
Details of the Dallas Sierra Club July 19-24 backpacking outing in the San Juan Mountains of

The outing has five itinerary options -- some in the South San Juan Wilderness Area, others in the Weminuche Wilderness Area. Unlike past trips to these areas, we're relying on private cars and car pools this July to reach trailheads. This minimizes your trip expenses, allows you flexibility to extend travel on either end of the Sierra Club outing dates and enables us to access more trailheads. **Early registration is advised**, particularly if you want space in our block of reserved cabins near Santa Fe on Saturday night, July 18.



Red, Gold and Wheeler, Labor Day Weekend Backpacking in Northern New Mexico -September 4-8

Enjoy a great outing this Memorial Day weekend. Explore the west edge of the Hill Country from a base at South Llano River State Park, near Junction, Texas. This park has **new** restrooms with flush toilets, hot water and **hot showers!** We've even arranged an option to camp in a motel in Junction. We've chartered a coach to transport you there Saturday morning and return you by 9:30 PM Monday (Memorial Day). Explore the Caverns of Sonora, historic frontier Fort McKavett and Devils Sinkhole State Natural Area (at twilight, to watch a tornado of three million bats fly from a limestone cave to search for insects). Monday morning you can rent a tube to float the clear South Llano River, hike some of the park's miles of trails, fish or sleep late before the party bus returns to Dallas. 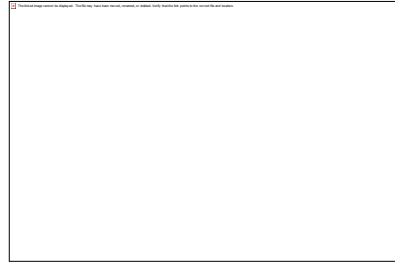
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Jun 21-26 (Sun-Fri) Beginner Long Backpack Trip In Columbine-Hondo Wilderness, New Mexico

A backpack trip several days in length is a very different experience from a weekend trip. But entirely too many people restrict themselves to just weekend trips. Besides taking a leisurely trip to enjoy a newly designated Wilderness area we will try to introduce some new people to the pleasures of a longer trip. Our first day we will hike a short distance and spend the night to give ourselves time to adjust to altitude at 8,400 feet. The second day we'll travel another 3 ½ miles or so (with a climb of about 1,600 feet) to our base camp in a nice meadow at 10,000 feet. From there we will have 3 days to dayhike, explore one of my favorite areas, and just enjoy being there.

There are two small lakes (one off-trail) that we can reach and, weather permitting, we might hike to the top of 12,115 foot Lobo Peak. We'll spend a total of 6 days and 5 nights in the Wilderness. If you want to see what a longer trip is like or just want to enjoy a leisurely trip in a pretty area, come along!
