The Compost Contribution: How gardeners' black gold can help protect the planet

You do two good things when you make a pile of brown leaves and assorted green waste, then encourage it to rot: You prolong the life of your landfill, and you produce something that contributes to a healthier environment. And you can do this at any scale and in any number of ways, using a remarkable range of ingredients. You can compost as a community garden, a city, a county, a business, or just as one person.

Few activities encompass such a wide range of raw materials, methods, and personal styles. And surely there aren't many products, homemade or industrial, that can help with everything from methane reduction to habitat restoration.

The presentation will include a little history, a brief look at methods, and examples of uses, particularly those beneficial to the environment. All this as seen through the eyes of John Darling, a backyard composter / tree hugger who fell into a job as campus composter for UT Arlington.

Poison Ivy

In this subversively funny talk, Amy Martin, author of Itchy Business: How to Treat the Poison Ivy and Poison Oak Rash, Prevent Exposure and Eradicate the Plant (www.ltchy.Biz), will share her deep knowledge gleaned from 12 years working in wildlife habitat management. Martin breaks the rash into 4 stages for her unique approach, each with a different tactic using the 3 Cs of rash relief: calm, cool and constrict. Home remedies are ranked and rated,



as are a world of unique herbal and mineral rash products. The many ways to practice safe scratch are revealed. She details how to prevent the poison ivy allergen urushiol from reaching the skin and the right way to remove it if it does. Martin shares the weird (urushiol mummies, poison lacquer, and trees that fume urushiol) and the wonderful (poison ivy's excellence for wildlife and erosion control) in a talk that will leave you itching for more.

The last energy conference was a sellout event. This year's conference promises to be even more exciting, with topics and speakers addressing some of the most talked about energy issues of the day.

Eighteen speakers have already been confirmed, including:

Climate/Energy - Internationally renowned climate scientist Kathryn Hayhoe, recently featured as one of Time Magazine's 100 Most Influential People will present.

Fracking/Waste Disposal/Earthquakes - Seismologist Brian Stump from SMU, known for his research with a team of colleagues into earthquakes that jostled North Texas and the DFW area since 2008 will discuss their findings.

100% Renewable Texas Community - Chris Foster, Manager of Resource Planning and Integration for the City of Georgetown will speak to their city adopting 100% renewable energy.

Affordable Solar for Your Home - Larry Howe, vice chair of TSES, will speak to what's available for the public regarding the considerations and plans for affordable solar for your home.

Fracking/Water Contamination - Zac Hildenbrand of UTA-CLEAR, whose group continues its studies of environmental quality in proximity to unconventional oil and gas extraction sites will speak about his peer-reviewed findings on water and fracking.

Energy Economics - Environmental Engineering Professor Marc Jacobson of Stanford, a leader in the field of air pollution, global warming, large-scale clean-renewable energy solutions will speak on the economics of today's energy sources.

State of Texas Energy - Warren Lasher, ERCOT System Planning, managing the flow of electric power to 24 million Texans will speak to where Texas is in its energy portfolio.

Fracking/Health Effects - Anne Epstein, MD, Chair of the Lubbock City Board of Health, who has gathered studies and published findings regarding the relationship between fracking and health effects within various communities will also present.

For 25 years, local residents, concerned citizens, and the Ktunaxa Nation have strongly opposed this development for environmental, economic, and spiritual reasons. Development has continued to move forward despite overwhelming opposition. The film highlights the tension between the protection of wilderness and the backcountry experience and ever-increasing development interests in wild places.

We will also have a program about **Trinity Environmental Academy**. Learn about Trinity Environmental Academy (TriEA), Dallas' first environmentally focused public-charter/private college partnership on the Paul Quinn College campus. The mission of TriEA is to provide an innovative, community-based environmental education to engage and empower scholars to become tomorrow's global change agents.
