City of Dallas Climate Action Plan

It is time to encourage your Dallas City Council members to pass CECAP soon.

Since January 2019 the City of Dallas Office of Environmental Quality and Sustainability has been developing a Comprehensive Environmental and Climate Action Plan, with input from citizens at dozens of meetings in all parts of the city and with advice from a stakeholder advisory committee that includes several Sierra Club members who represent a wide variety of community and business interests.

In December Dr. Susan Alvarez from OEQS presented our general meeting program. Beginning in November, 2019, the new Environment and Sustainability Committee, chaired by Council Member Omar Narvaez, held public monthly meetings, available on video, to obtain a deep understanding of CECAP. In February 2020 The OEQS invited more public input on the draft CECAP in a month-long online forum. OEQS has revised CECAP, and is available to brief Council Members if needed. The plan provides for regular revision as technology and climate change impacts develop.

We in the Dallas Sierra Club conservation committee hope to see CECAP passed as soon as possible. One reason to pass the plan quickly is money. Cities with a climate action plan become eligible for funds through C40.org and other funders. Climate plan cities have group purchasing opportunities that can save money as well. In addition, some actions such as replacing lights with LEDs and converting fleets to electric vehicles are less expensive in the long run than retaining old lighting and vehicles. The comprehensive measures in the plan include emergency and food planning, particularly for low-income neighborhoods, to help the city better manage just such climate-related emergencies as the current epidemic, October's tornado swarm, and the 2017 floods and drought.

The original plan was to have CECAP ready for a Council vote on Earth Day, April 22, 2020. The schedule of the city council vote will depend on council members, but it is important that council members hear from their constituents that we want Dallas to become a Climate Plan city as soon as it can.

About the Southern Border Wall by John T. "Doc" Baker

The Border wall issue is a big one, from every standpoint. People who are in the know about the border are against the Wall. Even ground level Border Patrol people are against it. Upper level people have to be for it, or lose their jobs, I suppose.

The vast majority of illegal immigrants and narcotics are smuggled through Ports of Entry, not out there in the country where walls are being built. Walls are being built and land being taken away in places where there has never been a single documented case of drugs or humans ever coming through those places.

Since 1963, I have been going to the Rio Grande and Mexico regularly, sometimes spending six weeks a year along the Rio Grande. I was a River guide for twelve years, guiding over 2,000 politicians, senators, congressmen, legislators, TV people, and regular people along the Rio Grande. I have camped, backpacked, and explored both sides of the river for fifty-seven years. Over a nineteen year period I was a missionary dentist along the Rio Grande and into Mexico in the Chihuahua and Coahuila Deserts. I made thirty-nine trips to the poverty areas where people lived in caves, dugouts and huts made from river cane and scrap materials. I have been taken into custody in Mexico. I have worked on smugglers, bandits, and once did dental work on the cartel as they stood around me with their AK 47's across their laps .

Throughout these years, I have also been involved in wildlife restoration activities along the border, involving Bighorn Sheep, Black Bears, peregrine falcons, mule deer, Jaguar and Ocelots. This involves interactions back and forth across the border. Some of the Border wall construction is to be in Federal Wildlife Preserves where no documented crossings have occurred.

Through the years I have learned the customs along the border and how the local county governments feel. No one wants that Wall. I have found that there are people who support the wall who have no earthly idea about the real situation. That is sad. I have good friends that support the wall, but who are totally without knowledge about that of which they speak. Dallas Morning News published a great article about the Wall being built along the border near Columbus, New Mexico. What a waste of money in the time of this horrible virus situation.
