The Next Generation of Environmental Leaders

Please join us as we welcome Katharina Kang, Education Director of Groundwork Dallas, and her colleagues Samantha Conejo and Adrian Sanchez as they outline *The Trinity River Crew* innovative program which provides meaningful, paid conservation work experience, education, leadership skills, and professional development training to high-potential youth from historically marginalized areas along the Trinity River.



The purpose of this program is to encourage and empower local youth through cultivating their leadership skills and providing educational and professional development opportunities as they complete meaningful conservation projects while under the guidance and expertise of *Trinity Park Conservancy* and *Groundwork Dallas*. Projects to be discussed will include: conducting water quality assessments, bird surveys, blackland prairie restoration, wetland restoration, invasive species removals, bee sanctuary creation, urban garden designing, and monofilament recycling bin production.

Getting ICO Program for Kids Back On Trail

Yes, the pandemic put a hold on our wonderful Inspiring Connections Outdoors ('ICO') program. As schools settle into a new 'norm' and the Delta variant continues to raise issues, we're continuing to monitor the situation to determine when we can regroup and safely get these amazing underserved kids back into nature. In the meantime, I continue to seek giving oriented volunteers interested in helping us at least a few Saturdays each fall and spring to help with the outings. Sound like your kind of fun? Rebuilding the Outings Program

Outings leader retraining after eighteen months of a COVID-based absence of Sierra Club outings is a priority for the Dallas Sierra Club. Only three leaders had full credentials to lead outings as of early September. Sixteen Dallas Group outings leaders won renewal of their leader training credential at a September 1 training session for current and lapsed leaders. Retraining after four years is required for all Sierra Club outings leaders.

Basic or advanced first aid certification is also required for all Sierra Club outings leaders within the two years prior to leading any outing. Since inception of Covid-19, in-person first aid classes have been neither practical nor cost-effective. Most of our Dallas leaders still require first aid training certification before leading again. To quickly rebuild our pool of outings leaders, leaders with certificates from a previous first aid class are now encouraged to secure online first aid certification.

Our targets for outings are day hikes in September, adding overnight outings in October. Check the blue �Outings � tab and �Our Outings List� for notices of scheduled outings. Bear with us as we rebuild to our pre-Covid level of offerings.

Drawdown: The Most Comprehensive Plan Ever Proposed To Reverse Global Warming by Paul Hawken

This book lists one hundred things that could draw down carbon dioxide from the atmosphere. These are practical, economical things (many are technologies) that are cost-effective and can be done now. Hawken writes a paragraph or two about each item -- in non-technical language -- giving the methodology and science behind each. Very interesting. - Kirk Miller

And it offers solutions to reverse these age-old practices. - Kirk Miller

Texas Nature and Environmental Centers Guide by Dan Moulton

This book serves as an environmental education reference, and also as a nature center travel guide. It's a virtual short course on environmental science for non-scientists. Teachers and group leaders (including parents) can use this book to help plan field trips and locate educational resources. The appended Environmental Primer will familiarize you with major environmental issues facing us, and direct you to websites where you can learn more about specific environmental problems and potential solutions.
