## SPECIAL ELECTION YEAR SIERRA CLUB OUTINGS!!! October 1980

In its usual innovative spirit in conservation and environmental matters, the *Delta Sierran* is sponsoring special election-year outings to acquaint its readers with the presidential candidates and their respective environmental positions:

Trip No. 1. *Alaska to Utah with Jimmy Carter*. This outing will begin in Alaska with President Carter displaying proudly the millions of acres of public lands preserved and protected during his administration. The group will proceed to the expansions of Redwoods National Park and Sequoia National Park acquired during the Carter administration. The outing will terminate in Utah where each person will be given a backhoe or a bulldozer to dig up the desert in preparation for the MX missile system.

Trip No. 2. Alaska to Waterford III with John Anderson. At the beginning of the trip, Congressman Anderson will collect from each participant 50 cents per each gallon of gasoline to be used on the trip. There they will be given axes, chain saws, bulldozers, etc. to chop down as many trees and plants as possible.
