

### GVP Group Endorses Mayoral Candidates

The Governor Pinchot Group (GVP) urges its members to get out and vote on Election Day, November 7, 2017. When you vote, please consider supporting candidates that are endorsed by the Sierra Club. This fall your local group is supporting three mayoral candidates because of their commitment to protecting the environment in Carlisle, New Cumberland and Camp Hill. Candidates were evaluated based on their answers to questions posed on the environmental questionnaire and in personal meetings with members of the GVP's Political Committee.

#### Tim Scott for Mayor of Carlisle

Incumbent Mayor Tim Scott has proven to be a reliable advocate for the environment. This summer Scott became the 147<sup>th</sup> mayor to sign on to Sierra Club's *Ready for 100*.

As mayor, Scott has promoted LED lighting, solar power (18 panels on the community center, among other solar projects), shade trees, edible landscaping on public green spaces, community gardens, bike lanes, and rain barrels. Further, during his tenure the city completed a 13-mile trail system and a storm water project.

#### Natalie Gehosky for Mayor of New Cumberland

This is the first time that Natalie Gehosky has run for mayor. Natalie and her husband, Lou, have an organic garden, two rain barrels, and three solar panels on their house.

Gehosky believes that clean energy needs to replace fossil fuels and she will work to educate residents about the need to move New Cumberland into the 21<sup>st</sup> energy future. As mayor, she will work to make New Cumberland more resilient from floods and encourage people to reduce, reuse, recycle and compost their food waste.

#### Debbie Smith for Mayor of Camp Hill

Debbie Smith is a small business owner and describes herself as "a people person." As mayor, she hopes to bring people together to address issues as a community.

In her spare time, Smith likes to bike on the many biking trails in Central Pennsylvania. Because Camp Hill is prone to flooding during heavy rains, she will work to preserve green spaces, promote the use of rain barrels, and make sure storm sewers are cleaned and maintained. Rather than deal with disasters, she said she would rather prevent them.

### **Executive Committee Election**



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# Join Us for a Stony Valley Hike

Join us as we visit the Stony Valley Beaver Dams and Acid Mine Remediation in Lebanon County on Sunday, October 29. The hike is a moderate 9 miles. From the State Game Lands 211 Rail Trail east gate, we will follow the rail trail west to view the beaver dams, which include a beaver hut and beaver-felled trees. We'll continue west to the Acid Mine diversion wells, where the abandoned coal mining town of Rausch Gap was once located. We will turn north onto the Appalachian Trail to view the remains of a stone railroad trestle and then to the Rausch Gap Appalachian Trail Shelter to eat our packed lunch. We'll then loop back to the parking lot. Meet at 9:30 am at the State Game Lands 211 Rail Trail east

gate parking lot on the west side of Gold Mine Road in Lebanon County. The parking lot entrance can be identified by the large brown 'Welcome to State Game Lands' sign on the west side of Gold Mine Road. Follow the dirt rail trail road .2 miles back to the parking lot and gate. Bring lunch and water. Contact leader Bob Rebuck at 717-319-4178 for additional information and map.
