

Detweiler Park by John Lenahan

Have you explored the newest Dauphin County Park yet? The 400-acre Detweiler Park has a lot to see. A series of trails from the parking area go through fields and woods, partway up the slope of the mountain. The trails total about 7 miles but they connect in ways to provide several choices of hikes from about 1 mile up to about 7 miles. Most of the trails are flat to gently rolling. Only one of the trails requires uphill walking.

Some of the trails provide views of Stony Mountain and the mountains further south, as well as views to the west into Cumberland and Perry counties. Wildlife like deer and bluebirds are often seen.

The Park is on the former estate of General E. J. Stackpole, Jr., a Harrisburg media powerhouse who owned newspapers and publishing companies. Anyone who grew up in the area and is on the older side may remember him signing off the TV station at the end of the broadcast day.

Detweiler Park is about 15 minutes north of Harrisburg on the south side of Peters Mountain where Routes 225 and 325 meet. There's ample trailhead parking behind the County Conservation District Office at 1451 Peters Mountain Road in Dauphin.

The Governor Pinchot Group will be leading a hike through Detweiler Park on July 14 at 10 a.m. You are welcome to join us — see the calendar for more details.

Trivia Corner Answer by David Platt

Which kind of salamander is pictured? Eastern Hellbender Cryptobranchus Alleganiensis

Also known as the snot otter and mud devil, the Hellbender was voted by the State Senate to be Pennsylvania's Official Amphibian. But a House leader would prefer the Wehrle's Salamander get that title. No decision has been made as of this writing.

According to the Nature Conservancy, the Hellbender, which can grow as long as 29 inches, is the largest aquatic salamander in the U.S. As an amphibian, it absorbs oxygen from water through its skin. It is a carnivore that eats whatever it can catch, including small fish, crayfish, water snakes, and other amphibians.

Save the Clean Power Plan!

There is still time to register your support for preserving the Clean Power Plan. The Clean Power Plan is not dead. Despite the Administration's announced intent to repeal the Clean Power Plan, EPA cannot withdraw the Clean Power Plan without soliciting the input of those affected. The Clean Power Plan is the strongest climate action our nation has taken to limit the carbon pollution from coal power plants.

As finalized in 2015, the Clean Power Plan would regulate power plants to reduce greenhouse gas emissions from the power sector. (The goal is 32 percent below 2005 levels by 2030). Doing so could prevent 90,000 asthma attacks and 3,600 premature deaths per year.

But EPA Administrator Scott Pruitt is hoping to replace this important climate action with a do-nothing plan that lets polluters off the hook. Repealing and withdrawing the Clean Power Plan is a double whammy for our communities: It will result in increased rates of respiratory illness and premature death while worsening climate change.
