In response to the grim news of marked decreases in populations of honeybees, native bees, butterflies, moths, bats, and birds, neighborhoods in Ann Arbor and Ypsilanti are connecting directly with neighbors to create pesticidefree havens that support the full

range of pollinators. Bee Safe Ann Arbor and Bee Safe Ypsilanti were established by volunteers who visited door-to- door and asked their neighbors to avoid using chemicals that harm pollinators.

Each household was asked to pledge to participate at one of three levels-

Level 1: No use of neonicotinoids and other systemic pesticides. This level includes not buying soils, seeds, or plants that have been treated with neonicotinoids or other chemicals that persist as poisons in all plant tissues and kill insects.

Level 2: No use of any poisonous from feeling overwhelmed by the products outdoors, including fungicides, political and environmental issues of Roundup (glyphosate), and other pesticides.

Level 3: Combine Levels 1 & 2.

The Huron Valley Group Newsletter is published 2 times a year by Huron Valley Group, Michigan Chapter, Sierra Club, 621 5th Street, Ann Arbor, MI 48103 In 2015, Ypsilanti's Normal Park neighborhood established Michigan's first Bee Safe Neighborhood of 75 contiguous yards, each pledged to participate at one of the three levels. Wurster Park neighborhood in Ann Arbor followed in 2016, as the second local Bee Safe Neighborhood. The result is geographic areas that are safe for people, pets, and pollinators. Next up: Expansion to additional neighborhoods!

Volunteers provide information on places to purchase plants and seeds, and lawn care that includes a mixture of grass with plants like clover and dandelions to provide food (pollen) for pollinators. They also remind homeowners to ask vendors whether plants, seeds or soils are pre-treated with neonicitinoids, which exposes pollinators to poisons in all parts of the plants.

Bee Safe yards go beyond helping honeybees, which are beneficial for agriculture, but not native to the United

As part of the Sierra Club's "Ready For 100" campaign, cities across the country are being encouraged to participate as part of the "Mayors for 100% Clean Energy" initiative. 



HOUSE BILL No. 4685 April 1, 1971, Introduced by Reps. Thomas J. Anderson, Goemaere, James F. Smith, Loren D. Anderson, Ford, Ziegler, Stackable, Buth, Powell, Trezise, Strang, Weber, Bryant, Robert D. Young, Gast, Defebaugh, Mastin, Novak, Davis, Clark and Thomas H. Brown and referred to the Committee on Consumers and Agriculture. A bill to require the use of returnable beverage containers; and to prescribe penalties. THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF MICHIGAN ENACT: Sec. 1. 

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Huron Valley Group ExCom Election & Guidelines

since our last edition (Fall/Winter, 2016), four members were elected to 2-year terms on your Sierra Club Huron Valley Group Executive Committee: James D'Amour, Vince Caruso, Rita Mitchell, and Ed Steinman.

Ahead of next fall's election, we would like you to review our ExCom election process in hopes that you, or someone you know, might be interested in serving on the ExCom beginning in January, 2018.

ExCom Election Guidelines

The Executive Committee of the Sierra Club Huron Valley Group (HVG) is responsible for the administration and operation of the group. The seven members of HVG ExCom serve two-year terms, with an annual election of either three or four members. The election is at the end of the year, but the process leading up to the election starts many months earlier. The group bylaws and standing rules describe the schedule of events for each election and require that the schedule be announced to all members.

Any group member can seek nomination to be a candidate in the annual HVG ExCom election. Members willing to serve can be nominated either through the HVG Nominating Committee or by petition signed by at least 15 group members. No member may be nominated or elected

against their will. The HVG Nominating Committee recruits and selects candidates. This committee consists of at least three HVG members, one or more of whom shall not be an ExCom member, and none may be a candidate in the upcoming election.

The HVG Election Committee is responsible for production, mailing, receipt, and counting of ballots. It also consists of at least three group members, one or more of whom shall not be an ExCom member, and none may be a candidate in the upcoming election.

HVG members who wish to be considered for nomination before the Nominating Committee is appointed may inform the group secretary. The secretary will also assist members seeking nomination by petition.

Ballots are normally counted at the conclusion of the December HVG general meeting, but the Election Committee may choose another time and place. Candidates or their representatives may observe the counting. Ballots and nomination petitions are retained until ordered destroyed by ExCom at their next regular meeting.

This schedule is defined by the group bylaws adopted April 6, 2000, and standing rules adopted October 5, 2000.

Kroger (Community Rewards) and Busch's (MyWay - Cash for Education) Programs: An Important Update

Thave recently discovered there are important changes to both the Kroger Plus (Community Rewards) program and the Busch's MyWay (Cash for Education) program.

Kroger Plus (Community Rewards) program: To be a participant in this program, for which Sierra Club - Huron Valley Group earns dollars to support our conservation efforts through our Shopping For The Earth (SFTE) program, you must register for a digital account. Many of you already have this account. The big change was in the fine print. In the instructions, near the bottom of the page, I found this: Do I ever need to renew my selected organizations(s)? Your selected organization must be renewed once a year, during the month of August. Go to kroger.com/topic/community-rewards. Simply follow the instructions detailed in the "Selecting an Organization" section to maintain or update your chosen organization. If you need help, contact Digital Customer Service at: 1-866-221-4141. Come next August, I'll remind participants to select your organization.

If you are already a digital customer, you may want to go to Kroger.com and check your status.

Busch's MyWay (Cash for Education) program: If you are a participant in the My Way - Cash for Education program (also benefiting HVG's conservation efforts through our SFTE program), you must identify Sierra Club - Huron Valley Group for each quarter in 2017. From delisting endangered species like the Gray Wolf to drilling for dirty tar sands oil, the threats to our environment have never been greater.
