## RE: Support for Establishing a Santa Clara County Sustainability Commission

Dear Santa Clara County Board of Supervisors,

As devastating wildfires have swept across California, fueled by a climate-driven drought, extreme heat and high winds, the need for action on climate change has never been more urgent. In response to the County's declaration of a climate emergency<sup>1</sup>, Silicon Valley Youth Climate Action (SVYCA) and the undersigned urge the County Board of Supervisors to support Supervisor Lee's referral and to establish a Santa Clara County Sustainability Commission.

Silicon Valley Youth Climate Action has been advocating for the Santa Clara County Board of Supervisors to invest in outreach and education efforts around combating climate change.

Taking a look at our neighboring counties and their Office of Sustainability budgets listed in the comparative chart below, we can see that Santa Clara County is **not investing sufficient resources** behind these efforts.

Silicon Valley Youth Climate Action has proposed that the County Board of Supervisors **take the following three actions:** 1) Invest resources and investment in the County Office of Sustainability, including staffing positions 2) Establish a Santa Clara County Sustainability Commission, and 3) Partner with the Santa Clara County Office of Education to support comprehensive Environmental Literacy and Education across our county, including opportunities for students to get involved.

The County of Santa Clara boasts over 75 Boards and Commissions, yet none of these are bodies specifically focused on furthering the County's Sustainability efforts. Even Commissions such as the County's Recycling and Waste Management Commission lack the scope to tackle the variety of climate initiatives needed across many sectors of Santa Clara's community and economy.

As we're continually reminded, unless we take transformative action to cut greenhouse gas emissions, things will only get worse. In response to the latest IPCC Climate Report, UN Secretary-General António Guterres' stated, "The internationally agreed threshold of 1.5°C is perilously close. We are at imminent risk of hitting 1.5°C in the near term. The only way to prevent exceeding this threshold is by urgently stepping up our

efforts and pursuing the most ambitious path.¹ Already, as part of the first major effects of climate change, up to 200 species each day are going extinct. Wildfires are destroying our western forests and many homes, creating air pollution harmful to our health and the environment. Historic floods threaten the coasts and many cities around the world including cities in Santa Clara County.

And more than 230 Medical Journals warn that our climate crisis is our greatest global public health crisis.<sup>2</sup>

The County and Board must work with our County Office of Sustainability and the community to expand upon their existing efforts to combat climate change, transition to clean energy, support public transportation, implement conservative and biodiversity efforts, and support an economic plan to drive green job growth.

To expand upon the collaborative efforts being led by the County Office of Sustainability, the Commission can bring community members and stakeholders together behind comprehensive climate and sustainability initiatives, with the goal of reducing emissions aggressively. We must empower stakeholders and community members to support outreach and education related activities, provide resources and support to help build capacity, and engage youth and students in the process.

We urge the Board to consider engaging students in these sustainability efforts including on this new Sustainability Commission as it is the younger generation that bear the greatest burdens from oncoming climate change and many in this generation are now taking the boldest actions to mitigate this threat.

Lastly, the undersigned believe that environmental justice, economic justice and social justice must all work in conjunction. To this end, a truly "just" environmental transition should provide good jobs with pay, benefits, and working conditions that meet our local community's standards and reduce harmful health impacts on the county's workers and residents, especially on vulnerable populations such as children and seniors.
