Baker's COVID-19 Scorecard

On Monday, the <u>Task Force on Coronavirus & Equity</u>, a coalition of 94 public health, community, and labor organizations that began meeting in mid-March, released a report card for Gov. Baker rating his reopening policies based on how they prioritize the health of Black and Latinx residents, low wage workers, and others that have been most impacted by COVID-19. Based on four key criteria, the Governor received <u>two D's and two F's</u>. In this report card we offer recommendations for improvement and we hope he heeds them sooner than later.

The webinar will include environmental and labor leaders across the region, and as well as a brief presentation from Vineyard Wind.



See Gas Leaks in Your Town!

Our friends at <u>Gas Leaks Allies</u> and HEET have released the <u>2019 map and lists of reported gas leaks</u> throughout the Commonwealth! This map and list will show you exactly where the new and unrepaired leaks are in your town as reported by your Gas utility. The maps can also show patterns. For example, repeated leaks along one road indicate pipe in poor condition below. The maps also show leaks near schools, hospitals, and other areas of special concern.



Please share the link to your town's gas leaks with your local fire department, board of health, and sustainability committee as well as your DPW and town engineer. Because gas leaks kill trees by suffocating their roots, please also forward the map to your tree warden and conservation commission to see if a leak is near a dead or dying tree.

Transportation Matters

Guidelines and Funding for Municipalities to Adapt Streets for Pandemic Response and Recovery

As Massachusetts moves through its four phase reopening plan, municipalities across the state are

making changes to their streets and other public spaces in order to ensure public health and economic vitality. A coalition of 19 organizations have developed a set of guidelines to help inform local plans for adapting street space in support of public health, safe mobility, and economic vitality.

Share the <u>guidelines</u> with relevant departments and staff in your municipality and encourage them to apply for funding from two recently announced programs from <u>MassDOT</u> and the <u>Solomon Foundation</u> that are providing funding to municipalities to quickly adapt the use of sidewalks, curbs, parking and other elements of streets for COVID-19 response and recovery.

Reject Canadian Hydropower

A longtime ally of the Mass Chapter, the North American Megadam Resistance Alliance (NAMRA) works to protect rivers and their communities by resisting megadams and associated transmission corridors. NAMRA seeks to: debunk the myth that Canadian hydropower is "clean" and renewable energy, shut down markets for dirty Canadian hydropower by stopping transmission corridors to the U.S., and promote alternatives to fossil fuels and megadam hydropower.

the NECEC corridor and to NYC Mayor DeBlasio to stop the CHPE corridor.

Governor Cuomo, Blackstone Group, and the Quebec Government are promoting the proposed Champlain Hudson Power Express (CHPE) \$3 billion transmission corridor as an economic boon and climate solution. In reality, CHPE is neither.

Canadian hydropower is a climate disaster and emits greenhouse gases on par with fossil fuels. This webinar will expose the facts behind the effort to greenwash the CHPE project and the increasing awareness that this is not "clean renewable energy."

Community Support & Mutual Aid

The One Chelsea Fund: Outbreaks in Chelsea have spiked these past weeks leading to a citywide lockdown. Chelsea is home to some of the most vulnerable groups in the Boston region: newly-arrived immigrants, undocumented families, non-English speakers, and low-income workers and families. Mutual Aid for Lawrence and East Boston: Two mutual aid efforts coordinated by our ally, Ania Camargo. Last week they supplied groceries to 111 people in Lawrence and 5,000 meals to residents in East Boston. These programs are bringing meals, plants, and food to people in their homes. This GoFundMe link funds both programs and this Mutual Aid Eastie Fund link goes to East Boston.

Christian Cooper Hosts Field Trip To Discuss #BirdingWhileBlack

Tuesday, June 30 at 2:00pm

The PBS Science series NOVA will be hosting the virtual field trip "Central Park Birder Christian Cooper on Birding and Inclusion," next Tuesday, June 30 at 2pm ET. The field trip will feature a discussion and Q&A with Chris Cooper, avid birder and a board member of the New York City Audubon, who experienced a racist confrontation while bird watching in Central Park in late May that quickly went viral. In the livestreamed session, Chris will discuss his passion and tips for bird-watching, his experience #BirdingWhileBlack, and his advocacy work toward making birding more inclusive for people of color and the LGBTQ+ community. Since the incident, Chris has been outspoken about the racial profiling that many Black birders experience in outdoor spaces.
