Election Day is November 3rd: Make a Plan to Vote

The election on November 3rd is shaping up to be the most consequential election that many of us will experience in our lifetimes. At the crossroads of multiple crises, your vote is more important than ever this year. Cast a vote for our health, our communities, and our planet.

You must have <u>registered to vote</u> by October 24 to cast a ballot, and there are three ways to vote in this election.

- Vote by absentee ballot/by mail. Ballots must be postmarked by November 3, 2020.
- Vote early at your municipal office from October 17-30.
- Vote at your **polling location** on the November 3.

Stop burning wood to be labeled as non-carbon emitting by MA state legislature

The Conference committee that is conferencing two climate bills is considering adding the House's definition of wood burning as "non-carbon emitting" to our state laws to allow wood burning to receive state incentives for making electricity.

Wood burning is dirtier than coal and this is an end run against hard fought woody biomass regulations, and represents business corruption at its worst as it is specifically sought by a company which wants to place an electricity generating wood burning plant in the <u>environmental</u> justice city of <u>Springfield</u>.

You can <u>sign this petition</u>, then <u>contact your legislators</u> to demand they contact the Conference Committee Chairs Senator Barrett and Rep. Transportation Matters

Proposal for MOR-EV Trucks Program

The Massachusetts Department of Energy Resources (DOER) intends to revise the <u>MOR-</u> <u>EV</u> program to provide rebates to include private (personal & commercial) purchases of electric medium and heavy-duty (MD/HD) trucks. Incentive levels will vary according to vehicle gross vehicle weight rating (GVWR) in alignment with the federal classification of trucks. To assist in addressing health outcomes in environmental justice (EJ) communities, incentive recipients can receive an additional 10% rebate increase for trucks registered in a zip code that contains an income EJ criteria block or can demonstrate greater than 50% of operations occur within one. <u>Read the proposal</u> here.


Statement and Call to Action on Potential MBTA Service Cuts

ACTION ALERT: Rally at Boston Housing Court to prevent mass evictions!

Thursday, October 29 at 12:00pm Boston Housing Court, 24 New Chardon St.

All out to a major rally this Thursday, October 29th, in front of Boston Housing Court. Massachusetts' eviction & foreclosure moratorium expired on October 17th, and over 100,000 MA households are at risk of eviction.

Governor Baker's plan to expand rental assistance will not prevent these evictions. And courtbased solutions alone will not prevent these evictions. To prevent this catastrophe, Massachusetts legislators must pass the Guaranteed Housing Stability bill (H.5018) which will stabilize renters, small landlords, and homeowners for a year while we collectively survive the COVID-19 crisis.
