As part of the 2008 Global Warming Solutions Act, the Baker administration is tasked with developing our statewide emissions reductions target for 2030 and the policies to get us there. How ambitious that 2030 target is, and how comprehensive the policies are depends on grassroots engagement. The Baker Administration's 2030 Clean Energy and Climate Plan has been released, alongside the 2030 emissions reduction target.

Sierra Club is coordinating with a number of allies to submit comments and also determine top priority talking points to better improve the plan. Update on the Next-Generation Climate Roadmap Bill

The road to passing comprehensive climate legislation in Massachusetts has been a long one. Here's a quick recap: the Massachusetts

Senate passed their original climate bill (S.2500) in January 2020. Five months later, the Massachusetts House passed their proposed re-written version. (H.4912). Finally, on January 3, 2021, House and Senate leaders reached a compromise and sent a final version of the bill (S.2995) to Governor Baker's desk for signature. The final version of the bill included important provisions, such as interim emissions goals for 2030, 2035, 2040, and 2045; codified environmental justice policies into law; and implemented a municipal net zero stretch building code.



We were then massively disappointed by Baker's 11th hour decision to VETO the bill . Despite receiving overwhelming and bipartisan support for the legislation in both the House and Senate, the Governor undid years of work in a single moment. Baker falsely claimed that the bill would halt new affordable housing construction and criticized features of the bill, such as the proposed new high-performance building code, despite the fact that his own agencies have proposed a similar policy. Unfortunately, due to restrictions caused by the two-year legislative cycle, the chambers were not able to meet again to potentially override the Governor's veto. Instead, the Senate and House must vote AGAIN to send the bill back to the Governor's desk. Thankfully, House Speaker Ron Mariano, Senate President Karen Spilka, Chairman Tom Golden, and Chairman Barrett have already moved to re-file the bill (now called S.9). To return to the Governor's desk it must pass both the House and Senate once again.

On Tuesday, January 26, Senate President Karen Spilka and House Speaker Ronald Mariano confirmed that both branches plan to vote Thursday (January 28) on the climate change bill. Stay tuned for further updates.

2050 Climate Roadmap

The MA 2050 Decarbonization Roadmap report has been published. This is the Baker administration's study to support their plan to reduce emissions in the next three decades. There are six technical reports to read through: <u>Buildings</u>, <u>Economic & Health</u>, <u>Energy Pathways</u>, <u>Land</u>, <u>Non-Energy</u>, and <u>Transportation</u>.

Abridged versions of the report are also available in <u>English</u>; <u>Português/Portuguese</u>; <u>Tiếng Việt/Vietnamese</u>; <u>中文/Chinese (Traditional)</u>; <u>Kreyòl ayisyen/Haitian Creole</u>; and <u>Español/Spanish</u>.

ISO-New England Grid Reform Tuesday, February 2 at 1:00pm Virtual Event

ISO-NE operates the grid that supplies electricity to the six states which comprise New England. The way that the grid is operated has a profound impact on regional carbon



emissions and the role of clean energy in the electricity sector. States are calling for meaningful broad reforms to ISO-NE's operations to stop economically privileging dirty fossil fuels in our regional electricity system. Eastie Substation EFSB (Energy Facilities Siting Board) Hearing

Monday, February 1 at 1:00pm Virtual Event

Eversource is attempting to build an electrical substation in a residential area of East Boston, in a flood zone next to the Chelsea Creek, yards away from a playground, within 800 feet of 8 million gallons of jet fuel. This neighborhood has already been overburdened by pollution from the nearby highway and Logan Airport. Substation explosions are frequent occurrences. The environmental justice organization GreenRoots has been actively opposing the substation for years, and they are currently very busy administering mutual aid in their community, which has been hit hard by COVID-19, so they could use our support!

Transportation Matters

The Transportation and Climate Initiative (TCI-P) Update

Massachusetts joined Connecticut, Rhode Island, and Washington D.C. in signing the final memorandum of understanding for the Transportation and Climate Initiative Program (TCI-P), a cap-and-invest program for reducing transportation emissions in the Northeast. The compliance period begins on January 1, 2023 with the emission cap declining by 30% in each jurisdiction by 2032, by equal amounts each year. The MOU requires each jurisdiction to invest a minimum of 35% in overburdened and underserved communities, establish an Equity Advisory Board, and report annually on emissions, investments and progress towards environmental justice.

In 2020, Sierra Club took some time to re-evaluate our position on TCI through the lens of the Jemez principles and the Equitable and Just National Climate Platform. <u>Click here to read our statement</u>. While Sierra Club is not supporting the final MOU due to concerns around policy and process, we will continue to advocate for strong equity and environmental provisions in the

MBTA Bus Fleet Electrification and Facilities Plan

The MBTA's <u>bus fleet and facilities</u> modernization plan doubles down on the procurement of fossil fuel powered buses and fails to commit to a timeline for 100% bus fleet electrification. Sierra Club together with 15 members of the Zero Emission Vehicles (ZEV) coalition <u>sent this letter to the MBTA Board</u> with recommendations to accelerate the adoption of electric buses and fast track the modernization and replacement of bus facilities.
