In addition, the FFRT sponsors "3rd Saturday" rides - on the 3rd Saturday of each month during the ride season. The first

By Mike Haley The Group Representative duties are bi-directional, i.e., to report Group activities to the Chapter (Michigan) and to report Chapter activities to the Group. The Chapter's main thrust was renewable energy in the fall by supporting proposal #3 Constitutional Amendment establishing a renewable energy threshold to be 25% by 2025. All the proposals were defeated by No votes: Prop #1 Emergency Manager Law 52.7%, #4 Quality Home Care Council 56.5%, #2 Collective Bargaining 57.4%, #6 new Detroit bridge 59.3%, #3 Renewable Energy 62.3%, # 5 Limiting New Taxes 68.8%. I was handing out literature on Election Day. Not



one person I talked to knew what fracking was. Some of Chapter's 2013 top issues are: 1 Fracking., 2. A movement in State Legislature to make all Natural Resources decisions be economic driven e.g., Senate Bill 78., 3. FRACKING!

By Ellen Waara What is fracking?? This is gross, but it reminds me of injecting chemicals into your mother's face, causing blood to spurt out of her nose. Yes that is dramatic, and so is the impact of pressurized injection of unknown elements into the water table, to break apart the resistant residue of oil reservoirs. Sounds dangerous? You bet it is. This is from the Sierra club Michigan website:

A new gas rush is taking place in the Great Lakes State.

What led to all of this? Michigan held a record-setting state lease sale in the northern Lower Peninsula in May of Nepessing News Page 3

2010, after word got out to natural gas and oil companies that our state may hold substantial reservoirs 1000s of feet deep in rock layers known as "tight shale." The technique for extracting these fossil fuels is called Slickwater High Volume Horizontal Hydraulic Fracturing, or just "fracking". Millions of gallons of water and thousands of gallons of chemicals are highpressure injected deep underground into fissures in shale rock, to widen the fissures sufficiently to extract the natural gas. While a similar technique has been used for many years in vertical wells in Michigan's Antrim shale drilling, its use in the Collingwood/Utica much deeper shale deposits introduces new concerns:

- * The deposits are as deep as 11,000 and more feet down, compared to 1000-2000 feet for the Antrim shale, and these for the most part require horizontal drilling.
- * The deep drilling requires much more water (millions of gallons), and the process is exempt from Michigan's water withdrawal laws, and the Federal Safe Drinking Water Act.
- * The drilling companies consider the chemical additives proprietary and are not required to make them public.
- * Though the wastewater that flows back includes these chemicals, plus naturally occurring dissolved chemicals including hydrocarbons and heavy metals, these liquids are still referred to as benign-sounding "brine". The waste liquids are disposed of in Class 2 deep injection wells and since they're designated as oil and natural gas waste, they have fewer protective

requirements, and the wells are exempt from local zoning. Incidents of surface and groundwater contamination have been reported in other states, including Pennsylvania, New York, Colorado, Wyoming, and many others.
