Nepessing Does New York


By Robert Simpson Several local Sierrans got on the "Climate bus" in late September to attend the climate rally/march in New York City, prior to the United Nations climate summit. The idea behind the gathering was to demonstrate the support that the American people have for action toward stabilizing climate and CO2 emissions that contribute to weather changes. If New York was the epicenter because of the location of the U.N., it was certainly not alone, as there were an estimated 2646 events worldwide in 162 countries taking place on 21 September. At least nine Nepessing folks were along on the Ann Arbor S/C bus, one of seven buses from Michigan. After a rather grueling bus ride, memorable, according to Richard Barron in a less than positive way, we arrived to take part in something, as Rich notes, that you will never forget. He noted the great variety in ages, races and the number of different groups taking part. (pictured right) Chair Denny Crispell, Carol Graham, Mike Haley, Rich's friend Robert Aguirre, Linda Berker and her friend Esther Fuchs, and Laurie Tata were among the

attendees. We were as a few drops of water in a rainstorm, as the crowd was huge and spread out the length of Central Park including the side streets. "It took almost two hours to get moving," Laurie noted, and by then, the dramatic moment of silence was on, a powerful moment for her and the rest of us, as it ended with a tremendous roar which came up and down all the streets in a great spine-tingling wave. She also noted the great diversity in the marchers, including children, elderly and people who were wheelchair bound but wanted to be part of it. It was a peaceful march with almost no reported trouble but many imaginative costumes and signs plus organized chanting. drumming, amateur musicians, elaborate creations such as a dinosaur made mostly from oil containers and huge signs which stretched across the

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entire street. Celebrities were there in force including Mayor DeBlasio, Jane Goodall, Mark Ruffalo, Sting, Leo DeCaprio, Bill McKibben and Senator Bernie Sanders of Vermont. Linda Berker noted that we were 400,000 strong but while official estimates ranged from there down to a low of 310,000, it was by far the largest crowd I had ever been part of and Linda called it a wonderful experience and hopes that we can change America's direction toward a new energy future. She noted that the new Iraq/Syria war eclipsed some of our coverage but remains hopeful that we can make a difference. Our group had





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many related causes on display in the streets which in some cases had little to do with climate, but would fall under the general umbrella of progressive/liberal viewpoints. We followed John Ford and Rita Chapman through the crowds for quite a while but eventually we thinned out and lost track of each other. Mike took a subway ride to ground zero, and finally it was just Denny, Laurie and myself and even after a stop for drinks at a Mexican restaurant, I was hobbled by now, limping along and unable to find an empty cab. Laurie took an intermediate position between us, trying not to lose Denny and worried that I might not make the last 20 blocks. Finally I told them to go on and after a rest, I was able to negotiate my way to the bus. It was another sleepless jaunt back to the Great Lakes State, but we rode contented, filled with great memories and a feeling of achievement. It was my 70th birthday on the 20th and Laurie produced a cupcake with candle and so the bus sang Happy B-Day to me and it was, one of my best in memory.

Pipe dream a potential nightmare -Public Comment Alert

massive natural gas pipelines designed to move Pennsylvania, West Virginia and Ohio fracked natural gas into and through Michigan to Ontario. Sierra Club opposes the massive ramp up in natural gas development around the nation through fracking that is just one driver of these new pipeline proposals because the drilling, extraction and leakage in delivering this fossil fuel falls far short of being "clean energy". Construction of massive pipelines has significant local environmental impacts. Several critical hurdles for any additional construction of these pipelines, include: acquisition of rights of way from private or public landowners; local permitting approvals if warranted; and approval by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC), which must follow the federal National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA). Specifically they must provide for a public environmental review process. We encourage members to attend:
