We have compiled a small interview to honor Mr. Paradise and recognize all of his hard work and dedication to our cause

Would you tell us a little bit about you and your family?

I've been married for 35 years to Lynne Paradise who I met through the Sierra Club. We have two children Neil, and Megan. Neil works for Housing and Urban Development in Philadelphia in the sustainable development area. Megan is a Foreign Service Officer with the State Department. Megan recently returned to the U.S. after spending a year in Pakistan. Lynne is a community activist who started and maintains an organic community garden in Arlington.

What inspired you to get involved with the Sierra Club?

After I moved from Canada in 1961 to take a job in San Francisco, I wanted very much to hike in the San Francisco Bay Area and to hike and backpack in the Sierra Nevada and other great areas of the West. At that time, the Sierra Club was the best fit for me as it had the best outdoors program with many outings in the West. I also was drawn to the Club because of its history of environmental accomplishments. After going on a lot of outings I then gradually moved into leading outings and I began to work on conservation issues after visiting great areas that needed protection.

How did you get involved in the Sierra Club and eventually its outings program?

I was initially drawn to the Sierra Club because I wanted to hike and backpack in the wonderful areas of the West and the Sierra Club knew just about all of these great areas. After exploring a lot of areas with the Club I started to lead outings and became involved in in conservation issues after visiting areas that needed protection.



What positions have you held in our organization?

Chair of the Northeast Florida Group, and Outings Chair, Newsletter Editor, Program Chair, Outings Leader, and member of the Conservation Committee, Political Committee and Nominating Committee of the Group.

Can you describe the outings program in a nutshell?

As the mission of the Sierra Club is to explore, enjoy and preserve the planet it is our mission in the outings program is to follow the overall mission of the Club. Our program tries to have a diversified set of outings for diversified groups of people. We want to expose members and other environmentally-inclined people to places that need protection and hopefully get them to take actions to protect our environment.

Why do you believe that the outings program is an important part of the Sierra Club?

Because it is in concert with the mission and get participants familiar with areas that we need to protect.

How has the outings program evolved over the years?

It has increased in terms of the number of outings offered and the number of participants who take part in the outings. Our participation in the Meetup program has resulted in a larger number of participants taking part in the outings program.

Saturday and Sunday, December 19-20, Blue Spring State Park Hiking, Biking and Kayaking Tri-Sierra-Thon Weekend Getaway

Blue Spring SP is a Manatee Refuge from mid-November to mid-March. Take Action to Stop the Hunting of the Florida Black Bear

The State of Florida has overturned a 20-year-old ban on the hunting of the Florida Black Bear and will allow the hunting starting this Fall. From a high population of 12,000 to a current 3,000 the State's largest mammal has been driven from most of its habitat. To protect the bear the State Legislature banned its hunting in 1994. However in 2012 the State cancelled the bears "Threatened" status to open the door to the hunting of the bear.

The Sierra Club opposes the hunting of black bears and continues to support the current FWC policy of capturing or euthanizing bears that pose a threat to human safety. The FWC Florida black bear management plan highlights the specific goal of reducing human-bear conflicts, which the Sierra Club supports. The Sierra Club believes that there are several ways that human-bear conflicts can be reduced without the need for the re-opening of the hunting. The Sierra Club also supports county-level ordinances to require bear proofing of waste, and recycling receptacles and waste disposal systems, and an increased enforcement of current laws which prohibit the feeding of black bears.

What was your most memorable moment on a Sierra Club outing?

Backpacking in Yosemite for the first time.

Why have you been involved in this cause for so long?

I have been an environmental advocate for many years because. I think that the protection of our environment and the preservation of the quality of our air and water, and the conservation of our natural areas are number one priorities. Sierra Club is a terrific organization. It has a great mission statement and its history of accomplishments as an environmental force is unsurpassed by any other environmental group. It has been a tremendous force for good in our country and I'm very happy to have played a very small part in the Club's success.

Please tell us about the history that you are compiling of our group.

- In 1992, which was the centennial of the Sierra Club, it was decided that groups would compile their histories as part of the centennial celebration. I volunteered to work on the project and I'm now in the course of bringing it up to date. It will describe the principal activities of our Group on a year-by-year basis from the time of the founding of the Group.
- How will you stay involved with the Sierra Club after stepping down as outings chair?
- I hope to remain a member of the Conservation Committee, and the Political Committee. I hope to lead the occasional outing, and I'll also try and continue to assist planning general meetings in Ponte Vedra Beach. I'll also hope to remain as the historian of the Group.

Where do you see the program heading in the future?

If we can increase the number of active outings leaders, which presently number about two, then the program can thrive and we can continue to be a one of the leading groups in the State in terms of participants. If we don't get more leaders then the program will become dormant. It all depends on members stepping forward and leading outings. It would be good to have outings for families, seniors, and disabled folk but we need leaders to be able to lead outings for these constituencies.

Drill, Spill, Repeat (video & discussion)

The NE Florida Sierra Club in Ponte Vedra will present a 20minute film named "Drill, Spill, Repeat" produced by Oceana.about the dangerous impacts of oil spills. We've previously examined the dangers of seismic airgun testing (more than 730,000 jobs at risk, death of up to 138,500 whales and dolphins, and more), but now, more than four years after one of the worst maritime oil spills in history, it's important to remember that seismic airguns are only the first step in a series of potentially devastating moves. A spill in the Atlantic could be even bigger than the one in the Gulf. Now is the time to break the Drill, Spill, and Repeat cycle. We cannot continue to put our ocean environment, beaches, marine life, and coastal economies at risk.

Erin Handy from Oceana will discuss the latest developments in the fight against seismic testing and offshore drilling in the Atlantic Ocean. And John Debus will give us an update on the anti-fracking campaign.
