Mountaintop Removal Mining

Join us on Sunday, February 24th at 2PM in the Union –Snyder Senior Center on 116 N. Second St. in Lewisburg to learn more about the horrific practice of Mountaintop Removal Mining. Without Congressional approval, the current administration made a rule change to the Clean Water Act of 1977. This rule change is devastating the beautiful Appalachian Mountains. The Clean Water Act prohibited industries from dumping waste into waterways. But the current administration redefined the world "fill" so that it now exempts mining waste and thus permits the environmentally disastrous practice of mountaintop removal.

The process of mountaintop removal mining begins with clear cutting the entire mountain top of trees. The devastation is made worse by the practice of wasting this timber. It is simply burned so that the coal can be gotten even more quickly. After the deforestation, the top of the mountain is literally removed so that the coal can be mined. Our mountains are being ruined, one by one. Permit by permit. More than 400,000 acres of Appalachia's mountains have been leveled and more than 1000 miles of streams have been buried by mountaintop removal mining.

Our speaker is Barbara Strangfeld who is a volunteer for Appalachian Voices. She is currently a resident of Clarks Summit. She previ-

ously was an activist in Ulster County, New York where she was an activist in many causes. She has received awards from the Friends of the Woodlawn Preserve and the Mohawk-Hudson Sierra Club. In 2006 Barbara was given the city's highest honor when she was named a Patron of the City of Schenectady. ☐

The Bush Administration's Office of Surface Mining (OSM) is proposing rules to relax environmental regulations in such a way that the coal industry would be able to use "mountain top removal" mining techniques to devastate more mountains, nearby communities and streams. Hundreds of mountains in the U.S. already have been lost to this coal-mining method and, if approved, the Bush rules could pave the way for the leveling of 700 more mountains over the next 10 years. As the need for a local food network increases exponentially relative to the economic and environmental damage inflicted by corporate globalization, there are some encouraging signs of resistance. The demand for organic, local products is exceeding supply. Farmers markets, CSA's and direct farmer-consumer contacts are all experiencing growth and enhanced interest on the part of the general population.

The benefits of access to local food is moving beyond "first adaptors" and the trend appears to be inevitable as oil prices continue to rise and the taste and nutrient content becomes apparent to the larger population previously limited to photo shoot veggies that tastes bland and contains depleted amounts of vitamins



and minerals. Although we just experienced a serious drought, at our CSA, Dreamcatcher Farm, it was generally perceived by the members as a successful one.

Distribution shares varied in volume reflecting the seasonality of the fruits and vegetables but were consistently bountiful and varied. Pick up day at the farm grew into a social event for many, and several pot luck gatherings were enjoyed by all.



Trout Run: Under Attack Again

Trout Run is an 1,800-acre watershed, located just outside of Coal Township (Northumberland County), and consists of lush landscapes, including wetlands (covering approximately 5% of the entire area), sand springs and a 35 million gallon reservoir.

The significance of Trout Run situated in the heart of the anthracite region is immense as it offers a stark contrast to the scarred lands that make up such a large part of our county. With its pure waters, abundant wildlife, and forested hillsides, Trout Run truly is a diamond in the rough and a very unique and important component to our area's heritage and future.

Several years ago this property was at the center of a heated battle when the Federal Bureau of Prisons (FBOP) sought to build a federal prison facility on the site. The Brush Valley Preservation Association (BVPA) formed in 2000 and worked hard to build a strong coalition of citizens, organizations and state and federal agencies to protect this precious land. As we neared the decision-making process, BVPA had 3,000 supporters who believed in the mission to preserve Trout Run. BVPA was never against the prison but against the development of Trout Run; in fact much of BVPA's efforts were used to identify a nearby alternate site, Natalie East, where the community could still benefit from the prison AND keep Trout Run intact.

When the FBOP solicited comments, they were overwhelmed with submissions and input from individuals, organizations and agencies, both state and federal; it was because of this tremendous support, that the proposed federal prison was defeated and Trout Run was protected for at least the time being.

Recently, Aqua America, the property owner, has

begun to actively market the property in hopes of bringing economic development to the area. The reality is that Northumberland County has numerous industrial sites, including many sites in the eastern part of the county that are developed and ready on which to build. In fact, over the last decade, tens of millions of dollars has been invested in our region for economic development, often lacking any local strategic visioning or accountability on the part of the business or local leaders. Unfortunately, this lack of vision and accountability has resulted in

businesses leaving despite the large investment paid to lure them here in the first place – this has meant the loss of numerous jobs and a daunting collection of vacant commercial buildings.

Taxpayers recently invested over \$6 million in state and federal grants and millions of dollars in state issued low-interest loans to develop the SEEDCO industrial park in Coal Township where Reinhart Foods is now located. To date, Reinhart Foods is the

only company housed in the 1350-acre industrial park. If Aqua America is interested in luring industry to the area, this is the site on which to build, not Trout Run. It would actually be less expensive for incoming industry to relocate to this site since the infrastructure is already in place.

BVPA will continue to work to protect Trout Run to keep it in its natural state; continue to work to open it up for public use with hiking trails, hunting, swimming, boating, so that it may provide surrounding communities a reason to attract visitors and even business and industry.

The economic, ecological, and social benefits of preserving Brush Valley can not be overstated and reckless development can not be an option. The BVPA will educate local officials so that they recognize the value of this property and its critical role in our community's future.
