


#### **Chatter from the Chair**

Happy Autumn and harvest season to each of you. Although my entire front yard is a prairie (Thanks to landscaper and friend Ed Max of Max's Greener Places) I am a sucker for vegetable gardening and tried a new genre this year. Pictured is a "Three Sisters Garden" which hosts organic sweet corn, pole beans, and summer squash. The beans wind around the corn stalks while the squash shields the garden floor from weeds, providing a happy, mutually supportive ecosystem for the three species.

I was particularly excited to try this garden version, since land acknowledgments, recognizing the original peoples of a territory, have become an important part of our Sierra Club culture. Briefly, we reside in the Council of Three Fires area, primary home to the Potawatomi, Ojibwe (also spelled Ojibwa) and Odawa, as well as several other native tribes. We acknowledge their original home, and it seemed a small gesture to try their gardening practice myself. (Being one of three sisters made it fun as well!)

## A Threat to the Treasured Wolf Road Prairie

Wolf Road Prairie is the largest and highest-quality remnant tallgrass prairie east of the Mississippi River, representing a part of the .01% of these landscapes, which survived American settlement in Illinois. This ecosystem supports one of the densest and most diverse ecological communities in the temperate world. In 1988, the IDNR designated this unique 55-acre site an Illinois Nature Preserve. Because it is surrounded by development, it remains in grave danger of degradation over time.
