"The Party Rock Fire"

Speaker: Clint Calhoun Thursday, December 3

On Friday, November 11, 2016, fire departments around North Carolina were called to help fight a wildfire in the western part of the state. A blaze had



started six days earlier at Chimney Rock State Park and had grown to over 2,000 acres, threatening hundreds of structures in nearby communities. The fire departments of Buncombe, Henderson, and Rutherford counties were already on the scene, but more help was needed. The Party Rock Fire continued to grow, with a peak size of 7,000 acres by Monday, November 21. (Source: legeros.com/history/stories/party-rock)

Volunteer for Spartina Seed Collection

The Charleston Area Community-Based Salt Marsh Restoration and Citizen Science Project offers citizens the opportunity to partake in environmental restoration efforts hosted by SC Sea Grant Consortium, SC Dept. of Natural Resources, Clemson Extension, and the SC Aquarium. Spartina alterniflora will be cultivated and transplanted into 5 designated restoration sites in the Charleston area. The first step to Spartina cultivation is seed collection. Volunteers will visit sites to be trained on how to collect seeds.

If you are interested in participating, please read the details below and register for a 30-minute session to come out to help.

Register to Volunteer

Seed Collection Details:

- Who Can Volunteer? Any person, over the age of 18, is welcome to sign up. Volunteers under the age of 18 must have a parent/guardian present. Volunteers under the age of 18 must also individually complete the registration form.
- Dates: Thurs. Nov 12, Fri. Nov 13, Sat. Nov. 14, Thurs. Dec 10, Fri. Dec 11, Sat. Dec 12, and Sun. Dec 13.
- Times: Varied (scheduled around low tide)
- Locations: Most locations are located within Charleston County. All sites are easily accessible by car and parking will be available. More details about directions and parking will be sent prior to your scheduled seed collection day. Site addresses are in the registration form.
- What to Wear/Bring: Wear closed toe shoes such as boots or old sneakers. Please bring sunscreen, bugspray, and

- water. You may also want to bring an extra pair of shoes to change into after you get out of the salt marsh.
- Format: Groups of no more than 10 people will have 30 minutes in the salt marsh to collect seeds. S.C. Department of Natural Resources and/or S.C. Sea Grant Consortium staff will be on-site for each seed collection day. You will learn how to identify stalks ready for seed collection, collect seeds, record data on the seed collection (on an app/website, or on paper), and store the seeds over the winter.
 - The mobile app is called Anecdata, please download for iOS or Android before your seed collection day
- Required Social Distancing and Masks:More details about COVID-19 protocol as well as a waiver will be sent after you register and prior your scheduled seed collection day.
