

Each of these individuals will work to protect our natural resources and public lands.

Congratulations to **Spencer Wetmore**, newly elected in a special election to fill S. C. House Seat 115, which represents James Island, Folly Beach, and parts of Kiawah and Seabrook. Impressed with her accomplishments as city administrator of Folly Beach and her deep understanding of the environmental challenges facing our coastal counties, the Sierra Club endorsed her candidacy. We support her in the November election for the full term.

As a registered nurse and educator **Debbie Bryant** (Senate 44) respects the science behind climate change and is particularly concerned with the health effects of pollution. She supports legislation that will decrease South Carolina's dependency on fossil fuels, promotes renewable energy, and focuses on smart growth.

Ed Sutton (District 114) has been in the forefront of the fight against the spill of plastic pellets (nurdles) into Charleston harbor with SC Environmental Law Project. He has made protection of the coast from offshore oil drillings, flooding, and development of low-lying areas the centerpiece of his campaign. Ed Sutton's positions align with the Sierra Club and he has the experience to back it up.

Daniel Brownstein (District 112) advocates for a regional approach to our coastal flooding and sea level rise issues, rather than a piecemeal approach by each municipality. He is particularly concerned with water quality issues, from plastic pollution to uncontrolled runoff. He opposes off shore oil exploration and on-shore infrastructure for the oil industry.

As a public defender, **Robert Wehrman** is particularly concerned with the negative environmental impacts of development, whether that be in the form of industrial zoning, a lack of high-quality storm water infrastructure, or exposure to pollution on low-income and minority communities.

The Sierra Club has a process to consider candidates for endorsement. First, for local candidates, the Lunz group will

recommend individuals or races to the state political committee. The political committee then sends a detailed questionnaire to all candidates in the race, except incumbents, who are running on their records. The committee then will review the questionnaires, records, and other information and make a recommendation to the state chapter executive committee who will vote to endorse the candidate.

The process is a little different for candidates running for Congress, with the national Sierra Club as well as the state chapter reviewing the records of incumbents and the national-focused questionnaires of challengers.

Vote and Volunteer!

The upcoming presidential will have a big impact on the direction of the country, including environmental policy in the coming years. Make sure you're prepared to vote in person on November 3 or by absentee ballot.
