The Majorie and Clark Jones Service Award Was Presented to George Hague by Pamela Nelson

George Hague was a founding member of the Moreno Valley Group and has worked tirelessly ever since then, being a major leader of that group and the San Gogonio Chapter. George has worked hard to protect and improve the quality of life in Moreno Valley. For many years he has made comments and participated

in the public hearing process. He has worked on many projects such as Moreno Highlands in the

early 1990s, and Villages of Lakeview, ts where he advocated for protecting the San Jacinto Wildlife Area and got other

organizations to comment on the project. For years he has worked on the Riverside County General Plan Update, where he is the environmental community representative on the plan advisory committee. George also has a long history of working to protect the San Jacinto Wildlife Area, advocating for land acquisitions, educating others about its wildlife values and writing comment letters. His has lead the efforts to keep huge warehouses out of the Moreno Valley and to assure that those that were built incorporated the best environmental principles

such as solar, non-water intensive landscaping, programs for carpooling to work, air quality and equally important,

Chapter's July Program: Plastic Paradise: The Great Pacific Garbage Patch

A Film by Angela Sun

he July 1st chapter meeting will feature the awardwinning documentary film *Plastic Paradise*. The 57-minute independent film was authored by journalist, sportscaster and television host Angela Sun. The film documents her personal journey of discovery to uncover the phenomenon called "the great Pacific garbage patch." The meeting starts at 7:30 PM at the San Bernardino County Museum 2024 Orange Tree Ln, Redlands.

In the film, Sun travels to remote Midway Island, ground zero for the mysterious phenomenon, which siphons plastics from three distant continents. Along the way she meets scientists, researchers,




<plasticparadisemovie.com> asks, "Every single piece of plastic that has ever been created since the 19th century is still somewhere on our planet. So

Released in 2013, Plastic Paradise won the Broadcast Award at the American Conservation Film Festival, the Environment Award at the San Francisco International Ocean Film Festival, and the Isla Award at the Catalina Film Festival. In 2014 it received the Jury Award at the Wild and Scenic Film Festival. It has been an official selection at numerous other film festivals from Hawaii to Georgia and from Boston to Big Bear.

Plastic Paradise is Sun's first full-length film. A graduate of UCLA, she was a pro/ am surfing competitor in high school and college. She has had extensive experience as a television and Internet correspondent for sports, health and lifestyle. She was the first Asian-American female oncamera personality to appear on ESPN, Fox Sports, Tennis Channel, and Yahoo

Sun was nominated for an Emmy award for her work on First Look on LXTV. She is currently host for Yahoo Sports Minute, winner of the Webby and Bronze Telly awards. She is a travel writer, health and fitness advocate, and played a part in the 2008 movie Street Kings. phone calls, doing computer work or making signs, we'll accommodate you in our effort to make the Sierra Club a political force in the Inland Empire.

Dr. Raul Ruiz and Mark Takano, our endorsed Congressional candidates, both won their respective primaries. Ruiz will have a very tough election in November, as his is one of those targeted by the GOP in pursuit of a lost seat two years ago. If you live in Congressional District 36, expect to get a call asking for your help.

We also targeted Congressional District 35, where Norma Torres won easily, and Congressional District 31 that saw a vicious battle among the leading Democratic contenders. This is the District that saw the four Democrats critically split the vote allowing Republican Gary Miller (awful for the environment) to get elected in a District with a strong Democratic registration edge. This year, Paul Chabot-R, who came in first and Pete Aguilar-D, who came in second will be facing one another in November. We expect to play a major role in this election to make sure that we have a strong environmental voice representing us in Congress next year.

interesting this year. We targeted two of them. SD28 affecting most of the Tahquitz and Santa Margarita Groups and SD20, in a race to replace Norma Torres. We did not make endorsements in these races prior to the primary, but with Jeff Stone-R and Glenn Miller-R finishing first and second in SD28 and Matthew Munson-R and Connie Levva-D in SD20, your political committee will act in short order to make endorsements in those races and post them on the Chapter website (sangorgonio2.sierraclub.org).

The only Assembly race where the Club made an endorsement was the endorsement of Karalee Hargrove-D in AD42-Yucaipa. She won and will face the very conservative Chad Mayes-R in November. In a district with far more Republicans than Democrats, she'll need all the help she can get from us to be our environmental leader in Sacramento. Other targeted Assembly races resulted in: Marc Steinorth-R over Kathleen Henry-D in AD40-Redlands; Cheryl Brown-D over Gil Navarro-D in AD47-Rialto; Freddie Rodriguez-D over Dorothy Pineda-R in AD 52-Ontario; Eduardo Garcia-D over Charles

Bennet-R in AD56-Imperial County; and Jose Medina-D over Rudy Aranda-R in AD61-Riverside. We'll be looking to make endorsement recommendations in all of these races during June.

Keep an eye on our new Chapter website as endorsements are made and expect a phone call or an email if you live in one of these targeted districts.

Our Chapter won't be represented by good environmental representatives if we just sit on our hands. We need to work to make it happen.

GENERAL INFORMATION, RULES & DISCLAIMERS

All Outings Leaders are Chapter Certified Leaders having appropriate Outings Training Courses, First Aid Courses, & experience for the Outings they lead. **LEADERS** may exclude individuals from participation if they believe they may not be qualified. Non-Sierra Club members may join outings unless otherwise stated in the write-up. All participants agree to abide by the Leader's rules. Participants should **CALL THE LEADER AHEAD TO SIGN-UP.**

WHAT TO BRING

Many Outings specify items to be carried by EACH participant. Do not attend Outings without the specified items unless you have first discussed it with the leader. Often the **TEN ESSENTIALS** are required. They are: 1) map, 2) compass, 3), flashlight, 4) knife, 5) windproof/waterproof matches in waterproof case, 6) fire starter, 7) first aid kit, 8) extra food & water for emergency use only, 9) extra clothing including rainwear, & 10) sun protection including sunscreen/sunglasses/hat.

ADVENTURE PASS SPECIAL NOTICE

Most outings occurring in the San Bernardino, Angeles, Cleveland, or Los Padres National Forests require a Forest Service permit for each vehicle (Adventure Pass). They are indicated by ** in the calendar. Be sure to contact the leader regarding permits. The permits cost \$30 per year or \$5 per day; however they may not be obtainable the day of your Outing. If you arrive at the meeting place without making arrangements with the leader & you don't have a permit or find a ride in a vehicle with a permit, you will not be able to attend the outing. You are expected to share the cost of the daily permits equally among everyone in the vehicle or a suggested \$.50 contribution from everyone for annual permits (above normal mileage contribution). America the Beautiful Interagency Passes may be used in lieu of Adventure Pass.

CARPOOLING POLICY

In the interests of facilitating the logistics of some outings, it is customary that participants make carpooling arrangements. The Sierra Club does not have insurance for carpooling arrangements & assumes no liability for them. Carpooling, ride sharing, or anything similar is strictly a private arrangement among the participants. Participants assume the risks associated with this travel. Drivers should have adequate insurance coverage & their vehicles should have no safety defects. Drivers of carpools agree to not consume any alcoholic beverages. It is customary for riders to share expenses with the driver. Five cents per mile per person for short trips is suggested while three cents per mile per person over 100 miles is usually reasonable.

LIABILITY WAIVER

In order to participate on one of the Sierra Club's outings, you will need to sign the following liability waiver

Sign-In Sheet & Acknowledgment of Outing Member Responsibility, Express Assumption of Risk, & Release of Liability

I understand that during my participation in this Sierra Club Outing, I may be exposed to a variety of hazards & risks, foreseen or unforeseen, which are inherent in each Outing & cannot be eliminated without destroying the unique character of the Outing. These inherent risks include, but are not limited to, the dangers of serious personal injury, property damage, & death ("Injuries & Damages") from exposure to the hazards of travel & the Sierra Club has not tried to contradict or minimize my understanding of these risks. I know that Injuries & Damages can occur by natural causes or activities of other persons, animals, trip members, trip leaders & assistants or third parties, either as a result of negligence or because of other reasons. I understand that risks of such Injuries & Damages are involved in adventure travel such as Sierra Club Outings & I appreciate that I may have to exercise extra care for my own person & for others around me in the face of such hazards. I further understand that on this Outing there may not be rescue or medical facilities or expertise necessary to deal with the Injuries & Damages to which I may be exposed.

In consideration for my acceptance as a participant on this Outing, & the services & amenities to be provided by the Sierra Club in connection with the Outing, I confirm my understanding that:

I have read any rules & conditions applicable to the Outing made available to me; I will pay any costs & fees for the Outing; & I acknowledge my participation is at the discretion of the leader.

The Outing begins & ends at the location where the Outing officially commences with leader & participants in attendance, as designated by the Sierra Club ("Trailhead"). The Outing does not include carpooling, transportation, or transit to & from the Trailhead, & I am personally responsible for all risks associated with this travel. This does not apply to transportation provided by the Sierra Club after the commencement & before the end of the Outing.

If I decide to leave early & not to complete the Outing as planned, I assume all risks inherent in my decision to leave & waive all liability against the Sierra Club arising from that decision. Likewise, if the leader has concluded the Outing, & I decide to go forward without the leader, I assume all risks inherent in my decision to go forward & waive all liability against the Sierra Club arising from that decision.

This Agreement is intended to be as broad & inclusive as is permitted by law. If any provision or any part of any provision of this Agreement is held to be invalid or legally unenforceable for any reason, the remainder of this Agreement shall not be affected thereby & shall remain valid & fully enforceable.

To the fullest extent allowed by law, I agree to WAIVE, DISCHARGE CLAIMS, & RELEASE FROM LIABILITY, & to INDEMNIFY & HOLD HARMLESS the Sierra Club, its officers, directors, employees, agents, & leaders from any & all liability on account of, or in any way resulting from Injuries & Damages, even if caused by negligence of the Sierra Club its officers, directors, employees, agents, & leaders, in any way connected with this Outing. I understand & intend that this assumption of risk & release is binding upon my heirs, executors, administrators & assigns, & includes any minors accompanying me on the Outing.

I have read this document in its entirety & I freely & voluntarily assume all risks of such Injuries & Damages & notwithstanding such risks, I agree to participate in the Outing.

Note: If the participant is a minor, the minor's guardian must sign on the minor's behalf.







North Peak Wind Farm and Southern California Edison proposed projects update:

As more information about these projects becomes available, one can more effectively evaluate the impact of the projects on our public lands and neighborhoods. The North Peak Wind Farm proposed for the Juniper Flats Area would turn the northern slope of the San Bernardino Mountains from an important watershed into an industrial zone; public lands into corporate profit. The map shows the roads that will have to be constructed (black lines), the numbered massive 400 foot high turbines and the routes for construction (green lines). The pink circles are "property intersection improvements." A new community group has formed to help fight these projects. The Mojave Community Conservation Collaborative has a facebook page (2 Save Our Skyline) and may be contacted at

2SaveOurSkyline@gmail.com. They are getting petitions signed, holding public meetings and meeting with elected officials, etc. If you are a resident of the Victor Valley and/or you value your public lands in the San Bernardino Mountains, these projects will have a negative effect on your quality of life. Although the project has been delayed (awaiting SCE's Desert View Substation and the Pisgah-Lugo Transmission line for interconnection studies) it is a good idea to begin now to voice your opposition and concerns. The Draft EIR should be out by the end of this year. 

The Citizens Climate Lobby is a group of citizens dedicated to promoting the political action on climate change. To accomplish this, they are proposing that a Carbon Fee be assessed on all fossil fuels at their source, as they come out of the ground or into the country. This fee would be collected from the businesses that extract fossil fuels (i.e., oil, gas and coal companies). Assessing this fee would raise the price of most items for us the consumers. To offset the financial impact of this increased cost the fees that are collected would be returned equally to every citizen as a dividend. What CCL hopes this will accomplish, would be to encourage the public to conserve and rely more on renewable energy technologies. It will help to "level the playing field," for renewable technologies making them more competitive with fossil fuels. The more that individual consumers conserve and rely on renewable technologies, the less of their dividend will go to cover the increased costs, thus financially rewarding conservation.

This would work similarly to what is done in Alaska. All Alaskan citizens receive a check from taxes levied on the oil and gas that is extracted from

made sure that the best environmental policies were adhered to during the building process, which greatly improved the projects. He also worked on transportation projects such as the Ramona Expressway Expansion, which ultimately will affect traffic issues around the SJWA and Moreno Valley. George has an encyclopedic knowledge of planning, traffic and transportation issues.

George Hague is a man of integrity, a mentor to others, and patiently encourages others to take part and make contributions to the Moreno Valley Group and community organizations. He has brought a lot of concern to Moreno Valley from other environmental groups and has motivated a lot of folks to follow through with their efforts.

Mary Ann Ruiz Was The Recipient of the Ralph Salisbury Outings Award

Mary Ann has consistently led Sierra Club outings essentially every outing schedule cycle since she became a leader many moons ago. She also participates in many National Outings and many other outings. She has served as chair of the Los Serranos Group for a long time and has now assumed a position with SC California. Mary Ann headed up local efforts for the San Gabriel National Forest Recreation Area and the "San Gabriel Mountains Forever Campaign." She also maintained a presence in development of the Chino Hills State Park. Mary Ann's contributions extend far beyond leading outings and include education, environmentalism, and leading campaigns.

Mary Ann has managed to do all this while having a hectic work schedule requiring world travel and raising a family. In Ralph Salisbury's words *she is a special breed without question and the closest thing we have in our chapter to Vicky Hoover*.

The Joe Momeyer Conservation Award Was Presented to Pamela Nelson

Pam's achievements in the arena of conservation and environmental stewardship date back decades, to before even 1970 when she established the recycling program for the city of Corvallis, Oregon. A microbiologist by training, her work has taken her to Baja where she lived for several years, and into the field of water quality and management in Carlsbad, before turning to education, where she earned Teacher of the Year at Fallbrook High. After retiring in '04, she decided to devote her new-found free time and her professional expertise to working for environmental and conservation causes, where she has had numerous successes, and like any good environmentalist, a few hard fought battles that didn't go her way.

Pam was a leading campaigner for the designation of Beauty Mountain and Agua Tibia as a Wilderness Area. She has worked diligently to protect open lands from the incursion of off-road vehicles. She has argued for ground water storage as an important component of water management in California and won a grant for a comprehensive water study in Anza. She has put on numerous Earth Fairs and recently secured a \$20,000 grant for upgrading the kitchen at the Warner Springs community center so Pacific Coast Trail through- walkers can be fed there. She is now applying for another grant so that it can be run by staff and not just dedicated volunteers.

In addition to that, she spearheaded an effort to get a 16 mile stretch of trail developed along the Murrieta Creek, which would span from Temecula to Lake Elsinore. This she did by securing a technical support grant from the National Parks Service and then lining up a team of city officials and planners, as well as community members. This project has just been unanimously approved by the last of the four city's City Councils.

She is a director of the Elsinore Anza Murrieta Resource conservation group, which secures land for mitigation purposes, and both the Chair and Conservation chair of the Santa Margarita Group of the Sierra Club. She is involved in the Steelhead Coalition and the California Wilderness Coalition and many other groups.

Pam knows just about everyone there is to know in her field now, and frequently acts as a matchmaker of sorts. One example of this is how she paired a Sierra Club Meadowview resident, who's HOA has 370 acres of open space to manage, with the Partners for Fish and Wildlife program. Three years on, this HOA is now, in just one of its several projects, grazing instead of mowing which has potentially great ecological advantages - especially in arid areas prone to desertification.

This list doesn't begin to cover the extent of Pam's exhaustive work for the health of the planet, but perhaps one more thing worth mentioning is that she is a huge supporter of a many, many groups with environmental objectives.

She is truly an inspiration and an example of the difference that just one person can make.

Ed Wallace Receives the Joe Momeyer Conservation Award By Ed Caliendo, Outings Chair, Big Bear Group

Por over a decade, Ed Wallace has focused much of his time and energy on defending and protecting the natural wilderness of the Big Bear area, San Bernardino Mountains and San Gorgonio Wilderness.

While Ed has admirably handled several leadership responsibilities within the Big Bear Group, none has been more accomplished than his tenure as Conservation Chair. Today, the City Counsel of Big Bear Lake and the Big Bear Building Department continually utilize Wallace as their "Go to Guy" for developmental approvals for home subdivisions, corner stores, and complex building or construction projects. The City wants Wallace's review and approval before proceeding with a construction project. The reason you ask? Wallace can identify the risks to nature and the animal habitat that depend on the wilderness to survive.

Wallace works closely with the San Bernardino Land Trust as well as the U.S. Forest Service Regional Manager to protect and restore land and plant life.

For the last four years, Wallace has been working with the Big Bear Valley Education Trust, The San Bernardino Mountains Land Trust, the USFS San Bernardino National Forest, the City of Big Bear Lake and other Land organizations to protect 302.5 acre parcel of forest containing the last pristine pebble plain area only found in the Big Bear area. This rare habitat is only known to exist in the Big Bear Mountains and was being destroyed by unauthorized access to gain firewood, off-road vehicle use, and trash dumping. Working together, the land has now been purchased by the San Bernardino Land Trust. With the added resources of the U.S. Forest service, illegal roads have been closed and land is being restored. In the future, this land will be used to educate Big Bear students on the "best ways to protect our environment."

Wallace also serves as a member of the "Friends of Fawnskin Board" a small community on the northwest side of Big Bear Lake. Wallace serves as their environmental authority when dealing with building development activities.

Wallace has made himself a positive role model for protecting our environment.

warehouse project proposes to put warehouses on 2,710 acres of land south of Highway 60 and if built would share a two mile border with the San Jacinto Wildlife Area, home to threatened/endangered species as well as more than 20 species of raptors. In April the project proponent paid to have large glossy mailers sent to the city's residents, used phone calls, going door-to-door asking for public support. Iddo Benzeevi's letter within the packet asked for people to support the project and ignore those who oppose it. "Those opposed are few but loud and they are counting on you to stay silent so they can bully their way into derailing our proposal with just a few loud voices." The city may have the Final EIR out by summer or later. Please plan on attending public hearings on the WLC which will be held before the planning commission and city council—you can speak or support those who speak. It is important that all voices be heard in the planning process. Please contact planner Mark Gross at (markg@moval. org) & (951) 413-3215 for more information.

Riverside County General Plan Update (GPU)—The draft environmental impact report (DEIR) and Climate Action Plan (CAP) were released in May. All comments were due by June 30. The GPU will have a dramatic effect on the land use patterns in the Nuevo/Lakeview communities and lands on the southern boundary of the San Jacinto Wildlife Area. Loss of prime agricultural lands, leapfrog development, & traffic are just a few of the concerns. 

And on May 3rd, we had a Pacific Crest Trail/50th Anniversary of the Wilderness Act celebration at Warner Springs where we had two hikes and fed the through-hikers free tacos. This was courtesy of a minigrant from Sierra Club national. Thank you Pam, for organizing this event.

As the heat of summer bears down, we'll have one hike in July, in the cooler elevations of Mt. Palomar, a 5 miler starting at Doane Pond, and then looking further ahead, we'll be at the Walk for Wilderness in Claremont at the Rancho Botanical Garden on Sept. 27. This is organized by the CA Wilderness Coalition and the Palm Springs BLM division.

This four city partnership gives new leverage to efforts to secure grants for the construction of the trail and influence in its development, as well as creating new partnerships within and between communities in south west riverside. Another Sierra Club spin-off project found its legs this month –about 2000 of them – all roaming the 370 acres of Meadowview home owners association, based in Temecula. For years the HOA disced, and then mowed their land for fire abatement but some long-time residents yearned for the days when sheep used to graze through there - and there was no need for heavy, soil-compacting, fossil-fuel burning machines to cut the dry grass.

These land management strategies came at a cost - both financially, and to the land which has visible scars and substantial erosion in areas which were disced, not to mention the disappearance of much of its wildlife, including the absolutely adorable burrowing owl. But at the end of May, after years of planning, almost 500 sheep arrived with a shepherd and two little dogs and the grazing is underway. In addition to the targeted grazing plan

San Gorgonio Chapter Executive Committee Election Rules


- 1. A Nominating Committee shall be appointed on or before July 22, 2014.





Chapter's August Program: "The Urban Black Bear"

Bosell, Natural Administrator Areas for the Los Angeles County Department of Parks and Recreation, will give a talk and slide show on the urban black bear at the August 5 chapter meeting. The meeting starts at 7:30 PM at the San Bernardino County Museum 2024 Orange Tree Ln, Redlands.

American black bears (Ursus americanus) roam through urban neighborhoods and down trash lined streets each summer and are typically captured in photos and videos. They are often the lead story on the nightly news. This is the urban black bear: bears that are second and third generation

born and raised within city limits. These opportunistic creatures are mastering the techniques of living with humans.

Bosell spent three years with the California Department of Fish and Game as a scientific

aide on an urban bear study which trapped and radio-collared bears. She tracked the bears to determine how much time the bears were spending in urban areas, what they were eating and where they were sleeping while there. Later she worked for the City of Monrovia Parks and Police Departments, handling all black bear and



mountain lion calls and running their Bear-Be-Gone program for five years.

Currently Bosell administers natural areas in the Los Angeles County park system, which

include over six thousand acres in fourteen wildlife reserves and several notable natural parks, such as Eaton Canyon, Devil's Punchbowl and Vasquez Rocks, all frequent destinations for San Gorgonio Chapter hikers. She works out of the Eaton Canyon Nature Center in Pasadena.
