

### When Will Republican Lawmakers Catch Up To Their Voters?

Our 2006 report card for the California Legislature reveals that partisan division continues to mark our lawmakers on environmental issues. Not a single one of the Assembly's 32 Republicans voted for the pro-environment position on more than two of the 11 most important floor votes. Across the aisle, 46 of the house's 48 Democrats voted with the public interest at least five out of 11 times, and 19 of them had 100% records. Records in the Senate showed an even starker partisan difference.

What's odd about this deep division is that it does not at all reflect the sentiments of Republican voters, who are almost as concerned about environmental protection as Democrats, according to public opinion polls. For example, the Public Policy Institute of California found in its July survey that, when asked "What about the proposal made by Governor Schwarzenegger and other legislators to reduce greenhouse gas emissions in the state back to 1990 levels by the year 2020?" 65% of Republicans said they favored it, compared to 67% of Democrats and 68% of independents. Yet only one of the Republicans in the Assembly, and none in the Senate, voted for that proposal, the Global Warming Solutions Act, AB 32, which garnered votes from 46 of the 48 Assembly Democrats and 23 of the 25 Senate Democrats.

Attitudes on air pollution were similar. When asked "Would you be willing to see tougher air pollution standards on

ships, trucks, and trains that transport freight and cargo?" (if yes: "Would this be true even if this made it more costly for these businesses to operate?) 68% of Republicans said yes, compared to 77% of independents and 83% of Democrats. But 100% of the Legislature's Republicans opposed SB 927, which would have assessed a small fee on container cargo to pay for air quality, security and transportation improvements at the ports of Los Angeles and Long Beach. The bill passed with only Democratic votes, then was vetoed by Gov. Schwarzenegger.

Sierra Club believes that protecting our air, water and wilderness for our families and for our future is not a partisan issue. Unfortunately, Sacramento's Republican legislators are not listening to their own constituents on this issue.

The performance of our Legislature makes a major environmental impact well beyond the borders of California. As the Bush Administration and Republican-dominated Congress sink into a swamp of corruption and denial, other states and even some foreign countries are increasingly looking to the Golden State for leadership on many ecological matters. For example, 10 other states have now adopted California's Clean Car standards, and other states are already considering taking action modeled on the new California Global Warming Solutions Act.

# State Senate Environmental Report Card

For the past several years, the Senate has generally been much more supportive of environmental legislation than the Assembly. Of California's 40 Senators, 25 are Democrats and 19 of them supported all of the bills assessed in this Report Card. In contrast, of the 15 Republicans in the Senate, 12 voted against all of these bills.

# Governor's Actions on our Priority Bills

Continuing his trend of being 'a shade of green,' Governor Schwarzenegger signed only three of the seven Sierra Club California Report Card bills that made it to his desk in 2006. (The other four Report Card bills died in the Legislature.)

#### **SIGNED**

AB 32 – Global Warming Solutions AB 1870 – Stop Smoking Vehicles AB 1953 – Strengthens Plumbing Standards for Cleaner Water

#### **VETOED**

AB 1012 – Clean Alternative Fuels and Vehicles AB 2838 – Coastal Vehicle Mitigation Program SB 927 – Funding for Safer, Cleaner Ports SB 1640 – Water Use and Planning Generally, the Governor has been strongest on ocean protection and global warming issues, and weakest on growth management and flood protection.

When lower priority bills are included, the Governor's overall signing record for bills supported by Sierra Club California improves (25 of 39, or about 64%). While this level of environmental support is vastly better than the record of other elected Republicans in California, there is obvious room for improvement. For comparison, former Governor Gray Davis ranged between 75-100% during his 5-year tenure, averaging about 82%.

Schwarzenegger has also involved himself extensively in the initiative process. Unfortunately, he opposes Prop. 87, which taxes oil companies to raise funds for clean alternative energy.
