# **THIRST** A Provocative Film about the Commercialization of Water

Thursday February 24, 2005, 7:15PM. St Thomas' Episcopal Church, 2000 Highland Ave.

The film THIRST\* takes us from South America to India to California, presenting the people most affected by privatized water and what it means to them. Scenes from the 3rd World Water Forum provide arguments for organized development of water resources. Stockton CA residents are shown as they advocate for publicly-run water services. East Indian villagers make rainwater harvesting a method of sustaining their community's farming and drinking water.

Locally, the issue has come to our Great Lakes. Canadian and Great Lakes States' representatives grapple with the issue of exporting water. "Who owns the water?" We as citizens and environmentalists will need to be informed about the issue as decisions are made concerning water on the local, national, and the international level. What does it all mean? What about the environment? The movie will be followed by a brief update on the Great Lakes and Canadian efforts to protect water from export and diversion.

We will meet at St Thomas' Episcopal Church, 2000 Highland Ave., at the corner of South Winton Road and Highland (just down the street from First Unitarian Church). #### **GREAT ENDEAVORS ON THE GREAT LAKES**

No one in Rochester has to be told that we live on the shores of a magnificent Great Lake. But not every one appreciates the multiple threats to Lake Ontario or the enormity of upcoming national, state and local efforts to restore the Great Lakes chain. Here are a few of these multiple efforts which will soon become more public:

National. The EPA has established The Great Lakes Collaborative which is a major national study due for completion in 2005. It is designed to address the multiple threats to the Great Lakes eco-systems. These threats include pollution runoff, contamination or loss of wetlands, invasive species, toxic waste, and so on. It is expected that this study will be used to move Congress in 2006 to approve funding up to \$6 billion for the restoration of the Great Lakes ecosystems.

State. The Pataki administration is behind the national Great Lakes restoration efforts, particularly as New York stands to be awarded as much as \$1.3 billion for clean-up of Lakes Erie and Ontario. Another multistate effort, Annex 2001, is a proposal to strengthen water management and assure that there is no net water loss from the Great Lakes. Currently our states manage the waters under a patchwork of rules and policies. Annex 2001 provides an opportunity for clear and consistent water management policy.

Local. The Center for Environmental Information (CEI) has received a \$250,000 grant by EPA to create a plan for clean up of Lake Ontario. The plan is called the Lake Ontario North Coast Initiative (LOCI), and EPA is expected to fund this work again in 2006. On May 4 & 5th, CEI is planning a major conference in Rochester on LOCI and the future of Lake Ontario

<u>Sierra Club</u>. We have been working on the national, state and local Sierra Club levels to energize conservation work focused on the Great Lakes. As the Chapter Conservation Chairperson I was fortunate to represent the Chapter at the recent EPA sponsored Great Lakes Collaborative organization meeting in Chicago. The Chapter will be creating a Great Lakes Conservation Committee and our local ExCom has approved the creation of a companion Rochester Group Committee.

<u>Rochester Regional Group</u>. Last but not least our Group has chosen Lake Ontario and the Great Lakes as the major topic for our annual spring Environmental Forum which will take place on Thursday, April 21<sup>st</sup> at the Unitarian Church. Our keynote speaker will be Distinguished Professor Joseph Makarewicz of SUNY-Brockport, an internationally recognized expert on the Great Lakes.

#### **Environmentalism - The Next Four Years**

One of our most popular programs last year, "Global Warming in the Northeast," the lecture in November by Dr. David Wolfe from Cornell University, highlighted a new purposefulness and urgency of our educational programs. We had a large turnout for this program which zeroed in on the potential ramifications of climate change on agriculture in our area. The skinny is that some crops should do well (weeds) and others may not (such as cauliflower) as our area continues to warm up.

An added benefit of this event, one we should always consider in our programs, is the opportunity for creating new relationships. Dr. Wolfe describes this: "I am glad that I now have this connection to the Sierra Club in the Rochester area. I think sometime down the road there may be opportunities to bring some of the local leadership of your organization together with farmers in the area to address particular issues and search for common ground."

In the next four years, these kinds of programs that help us develop a closer rapport with environmental experts will become critical. The reelection of George W. Bush, with his dismal record on the environment, and the media that seems less inclined to report on the environment, heralds a new era where concerned individuals and groups like the Sierra Club must take charge of their information gathering. Just because our major news sources are not talking about these issues does not mean they are not critical: clean air, corporate accountability, ecoregions protection, environmental education, environmental justice, factory farms, genetic engineering, grazing, marine wildlife protection, species

preservation, nuclear waste, recreation issues, sustainable consumption, lifestyle choices, toxics, trash transfer, transportation, and wetlands.

More than ever, we need the dedication of scientists like Dr. Wolfe to inform and engage the public on critical environmental matters. During an administration hostile to the basic tenets of environmental science, a vacuum must be replaced by our active pursuit of knowledge and actions to keep our environment healthy.
