82% of Voters Support Transition to 100% Clean Energy

Yale's Climate Nexus program and George Mason University's Center for Climate Change Communication polled 2047 registered voters and on October 27, 2020 released findings:

- 82% support the statement: "The primary goal of U.S energy policy should be achieving 100% clean energy." 49% strongly agreed. 33% somewhat agreed.
- 71% support Congressional legislation "that would set the goal of achieving a 100% clean economy (eliminating fossil fuel emissions from the transportation, electricity, buildings, industry, and agricultural sectors) in the United States by the year 2050." 40% registered strong support. 31% somewhat supported.
- 71% supported "requiring electric utility companies in the United States to generate 100% of their electricity from renewable sources, like wind and solar, by the year 2035." 39% strongly supported. 32% somewhat supported
- 62% said they would be more likely to (44%), or would only (18%), vote for a candidate who supports "multi-trillion-dollar federal economic stimulus that prioritizes investments in clean energy infrastructure.'

Amid the noise of the November election, many candidates missed shifts in voter sentiment toward action to prevent the worst of climate change. There is no longer a technical, economic or even political reason to delay saving a habitable climate. Please contact your elected officials to ask for urgent climate action.

Karen Boba:

I have been interested in nature and our environment since I was young. It was an interest fueled by my family in the form of hikes, nature walks and trips to many national parks. I have been a member of Sierra Club for many years but it is only in the last few that I have become active, first attending general meetings and then becoming a member of the Executive Committee and recording secretary of the Susquehanna Group.

As a parent and grandparent my top priority is Climate Change. But my contribution to slowing climate change as an individual is negligible. It is only through group action at the local, state and national level that we may be able to turn the tide before it is too late. I believe that the Sierra Club is committed to Climate Change action and has the experience, funds, and dedication to make a difference.

Chris Harasta:

I became involved with environmentalism four years ago, this interest being sparked by the results of a certain election. I spent the first of those years learning about local groups and changing my lifestyle to match what I believed in. After I got involved with the SG I organized a garbage cleanup, two events teaching kids how to identify healthy streams, and a bird walk. Many of my accomplishments are through my career in dining services, where I make frequent operational changes to reduce waste and purchase sustainably. I am currently working on a project to replace street trees in Endicott that were killed by the Emerald Ash Borer. I have recently joined NEST, where we are working to improve county zero-waste initiatives. Once we can meet in person again, I hope to bring my hobby of foraging wild foods to the table and host a Wild Foods Feast fund-raiser.

Scott Lauffer:

Proposed Bylaw Amendments – Proposed new language in **bold.** Deletions indicated by *italie strike-through*.

4.1 Annual Election. An Annual Election shall be held in the fourth quarter of each year to choose ExCom members. This election and any special elections shall be conducted by secret *written* ballot *mailed* **distributed** to all Group members of record at least four weeks before the closing date of the election....The ExCom shall specify the calendar dates and deadlines for appointing the Nominating Committee (NomCom), production of eligible voter lists, receipt of names for consideration by NomCom, receipt of ballot issue petitions, the NomCom report of names of nominees, receipt of candidate petitions, appointment of Election Committee, preparation and distribution dates for ballots allowing at least four weeks for return of the ballots, receipt of returned ballots, and the date, time and place for counting ballots. The ExCom shall *provide written* **distribute** notice of this schedule and of the opportunity to nominate candidates by petition to all Group members.

8.2 Amendment. These Bylaws are fundamental and shall not be added to, amended or repealed except by a two-thirds vote of the Group ExCom and a two-thirds vote of all *mail* ballots cast in an Annual or Special Election.

- co-sponsored with VERSE (Vestal Residents for Safe Energy) a (pre-pandemic) public meeting on climate change.
- solicited, with Waterman Conservation Center, donations to treat the invasive woolly adelgid infestation of significant hemlock stands at the IBM Glen.
- hosted an online meet-the-candidates night. Local candidates endorsed by Susquehanna Group spoke about their positions and plans concerning the environment.
- researched and participated in proposed local renewable energy projects: (1) Lithium-ion Battery Recycling plant in Endicott, (2) Bluestone Wind Project in Towns of Sanford and Windsor, Broome County.
