#### HART's Fracked Bus Plan

Attendees at the December 9 CNG Information Session hosted by HART were treated to an interesting, if inaccurate, comparison of Green House Gas (GHG) emissions from diesel, CNG and electric buses. It was interesting because HART has decided to use its portion of the Volkswagen settlement proceeds to buy CNG




Figure 2 The greenhouse gas footprints of shale gas, conventional natural gas, oil, and coal expressed as g CO, equivalents per MJ of heat produced.

buses (most other are buying electric) but inaccurate because their analysis minimized the impact of "fugitive" methane, the gas that escapes during the extraction, processing and transporting of CNG.

Experts disagree on the exact amount of fugitive methane associated with CNG. Some say it is as much as 12%. The average estimate is 4.5%. But they agree that the importance of fugitive methane is vastly underrated. Methane is 80 times more potent as an earth warmer than CO2. And while atmospheric CO2 has gone up a bit more than 30% since pre-industrial times, methane has increase 125%! Switching from coal or diesel to CNG does nothing to reduce climate change and may actually make it worse. Living in the Sunshine State, where we have abundant solar energy available, HART's decision was shortsighted and ill-informed

<u>Conservation Committee Report:</u> The Conservation Committee and Transportation and Water Sub-Committees meet on Mondays, **January 13 and February 10** at 6:30 PM at <u>St. Paul Lutheran Church</u>, <u>5103 North Central Ave</u>, Tampa. We meet in the <u>Snyder Building</u>, directly behind the church.

There are many things going on right now, and the more volunteers we have, the more we can do! Come to the meeting to learn more and see where you might want to get involved.

**LAND:** Upper Tampa Bay Trail – thanks to public opposition, the developer has withdrawn their apartment complex proposal that would have had 1000s of cars crossing the popular trail every day.

**WATER:** Southwest Florida Water Management District has issued a 5 year assessment of the Hillsborough River. Sierra Club has been listed as a stakeholder and Sid Flannery is doing an analysis. Florida Potable Reuse Commission is developing standards for water reuse such as proposed by the Tampa Augmentation Project (TAP) – Benjamin Ochshorn, Water sub-committee chair.

<u>CLEAN AIR:</u> Ready for 100 Launch - We will work with Tampa Mayor Jane Castor, City Council and County Commissioners to sign up Tampa for 100% Renewable energy. If you would like to join this effort, contact Phil Compton: **phil.compton@sierraclub.org**, 813-841-3601.

**TREES:** Florida HB 1159 allows trees to be removed if they present a danger. Thanks to all who wrote in protest to the removal of 65 tress at Plant High School for a track. The trees are going to stay!

<u>FERRY:</u> Permanent ferry service based in South County can start in just three years. The County's private partner, HMS Ferries, has agreed to run the service without taxpayer operating subsidies. And Mosaic has offered free land for a South County ferry terminal at its Big Bend facilities. The ferry service will include:

- Year-round weeknight & weekend service: South County, Downtown Tampa and Downtown St. Pete
- Weekday commuter service: South County to MacDill AFB, taking 1000s of commuter trips off our roads

The \$35 million capital cost of the ferry project is less than the cost of widening 1-2 miles of county roadway.

**STATE:** The Sierra Chapter Conservation Committee has a goal of acquiring 30% more land for conservation by 2030. Volunteers are needed for Chapter Growth Management and Water Quality working groups.

<u>M-CORES</u>: Contact FDOT at fdot.listens@dot.state.fl.us and let them know that you oppose the M-CORES project: 3 new major toll roads that will destroy large swaths of Florida's last remaining rural lands, pollute waterways, and threaten endangered wildlife including the iconic Florida panther.

## The No Roads To Ruin Collation

Earlier this year, the Florida state legislature passed a bill to fast-track three major new toll roads that will destroy large swaths of Florida's last remaining rural lands, pollute water-

ways, and threaten endangered wildlife including the iconic Florida panther. If completed, 330 miles of toll roads could be constructed by 2030. Road building alone will immediately destroy more than 52,800 acres of undeveloped areas and promote unsustainable sprawl, destroying hundreds of thousands of additional acres.

We are a coalition of concerned citizens committed to opposing these "roads to ruin." Please join us in the fight to preserve Florida's remaining natural areas.

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crumbling but the legislature has already allocated \$135 million to advance the Roads to Ruin.



**BAD FOR OUR HEALTH:** New roads will increase air and water pollution and destroy wetlands, springs and aquifer recharge areas.

**BAD FOR OUR WILDLIFE:** The three toll roads will slice through some of the best remaining natural and agricultural areas, permanently severing connectivity within the Florida Wildlife Corridor affecting animals like the endangered Florida panther.

BAD GOVERNMENT AND BAD POLICY: The toll roads bill (SB7068) was rushed through the Florida House with almost no discussion or debate and quietly signed by the Governor despite the enormous public demand for a veto. While supporters claim they were "well vetted," they were never publicly discussed before spring 2019. The proposed routes were not included in FDOT's 5-year plans and, in 2016, the FDOT Interstate 75 Relief Task Force recommended expanding the vehicle capacity of the interstate and connecting highways rather than build new roads.

**BAD FOR OUR RURAL COMMUNITIES:** Small towns may be left behind as new toll roads bypass their communities or create an influx of new, unwanted strip malls and subdivisions.
