

100% Clean Energy Resolution for Snohomish County

Snohomish County Council unanimously passed a resolution committing the county to 100% clean, renewable energy. The resolution commits the county to a goal of 100% clean electricity by 2030 and 100% clean energy, sector-wide including transportation and other energy sectors, by 2045. The challenge now is follow-through on the commitment.

Clear Cutting at Picnic Point

The Snohomish County Council voted 4 to 1 to allow clear cutting on a steep slope near a salmon stream at Picnic Point, putting homes below at risk of a mud slide. The action was taken after years of fighting the developers in court and before all permits had been granted.
