

Many of our shallow detractors are like Congresswoman Ashley Hinson who in her "The Bottom Line" Weakly... ooops Weekly Wrap-Up, when castigating the "Inflation Reduction Act," includes the following: "Tax Breaks for the Wealthy: It's full of giveaways for wealthy Americans, like a tax break for buying a luxury electric vehicle. You can't get more out-of-touch." First, who was it during Trump's regime that approved huge tax breaks for the wealthy corporate interests? 
It seems there may be another similar measure that would ban abortion. Do your research!!! We need a healthy and wanted population.

Fall Creek Falls

This majestic waterfall plunges into a gorge containing one of the last stands of virgin forest in the Southeast. From this point you may see several mature hemlocks and yellow poplars, the primary tree species growing in this cool, moist, shaded gulf. In winter, snow and ice creates a magnificent scene of solitude and beauty.

Fall Creek Falls, at 256 feet, is the highest waterfall east of the Rocky Mountains. The waters of Fall Creek have cut through the rock to expose geologic formations related of years old. These rocks are the remnants of sandy dunes, tidal plains, salt marshes, or swamps, giving each layer a different texture and color.



### Support & vote for Environmentally Astute candidates!

Why? Because threatening the sustainable, life supporting, natural resources of planet Earth seems to be the goal of certain political interests. They shound not prevail! Some points to ponder:

**High Country News, Persective, April, 2021**: "The Trump Administration dismantled 50 years of conservation." "Donald Trump and his appointed officials took advantage of weak laws, a distracted public, hard-to-follow administrative actions, and their own deep animus against science and professional land managers to profoundly harm American conservation." "We should all be shocked by how easy it was."

**National Geographic, 09/2022**: Bears Ears Southeastern Utah: "This spectacular landscape is a symbol of the risk to some of the country's unique and irreplaceable places. One president preserved it at the urging of Native Americans who hold it sacred; another tried to open it to drilling and mining."

**Ocean Conservancy, Fall, 2022**: "...climate change is disrupting the world's fisheries. ....marine life has been migrating to cooler waters – shifting toward the North or South Poles... Fishery-dependent, coastal economies ... are particularly vulnerable..."

### Natural Resources Defense Council, Fall, 2022:

- 1. Better Bulbs: The U.S. Dept. of Energy issued rules to increase efficiency of ordinary light bulbs and phase out inefficient bulbs. The standards, to go into effect 2 years ago, were blocked by the Trump adminstration. NRDC and allies went to court. The rules could save \$3 billion annually in utility costs and avoid 220 million metric tons of carbon emissions over the next 30 years.
- 2. "Trump-Era Endangered Species Attack Reversed" "Trump adminstration's attempt to sabotage the Endangered Species Act (was) the most aggressive assault on the landmark conservation law in its nearly 50-year history."
- 3. "EPA Moves to Veto Alaska Mega-Mine" The Obama administration's EPA proposed to use the Clean Water Act to adopt safeguards to the Bristol Bay sockeye salmon fishery from the Pebble Mine project. President Trump reversed that plan. But, those safeguards are now poised to advance.

**Earthjustice, Summer, 2022:** The EPA has restored California's (and other states') ability to set its own vehicle emission standards higher than federal standards. The Trump-era EPA illegally revoked these state rights. Earthjustice and allies brought the Trump EPA to court and will defend the Biden's EPA from any industry challenge. Also, Mining leases that would threaten the pristine Boundary Waters Canoe Wilderness were greenlighted illegally by the Trump administration. In part to action by Earthjustice, the Biden administration cancelled the leases.

These hardly scratch the surface of corrective measures!
