HOI Group Excom Ballots

Sand Mining Expansion and Wetlands Destruction East of Starved Rock State Park


URGENT! DEADLINE November 5th. Email or Write Your Request for Public Hearing.

The U.S. Silica Company sand mining quarry four miles east of Ottawa wants to expand toward Starved Rock State Park! This is a for-profit, Texas based corporation and has nothing to do with the U.S. government. The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers is considering approval of a wetland destruction permit for the quarry expansion. Most of this sand is used for fracking (high pressure extraction of oil or gas using a cocktail of chemicals and high-quality sand to force more gas or oil out of the ground).

BE SURE TO HAVE: Request for Public Hearing and Comment CEMVR -RD-2022-1270 in you email subject line and on your comments. Key concerns include: this expansion will destroy wetlands at the site and impact Brown's Brook and another tributary stream which will increase sediment and other pollutant loading to the Illinois River; there are clear concerns for groundwater and surface water adverse impacts including harm to wetlands at Catlin LaSalle County Park which has the Catlin Salt Marsh *(See Hearing, page 4)*


Princeville Concentrated Animal Feeding Operation (CAFO) Is Doubling in Size

A second hog confinement barn has been added at the hog production business near Princeville. The original animal facility used a loophole to avoid a public hearing in 2019 by listing 2,480 hogs in their proposed CAFO barn, just under the 2,500 number that would have allowed a public hearing established by a Peoria County Board resolution nearly twenty years ago. The property owner, Eleanor Basehoar, did not heed any local concerns regarding drawdown of the area water supply or for odors impacting Princeville. Now a second barn has been added and it is likely the number of animals at the location will double. Another loophole in the Illinois Department of Agriculture's minimal regulations for CAFOs allows a new confinement building without any new permit or public process when it is part of an expansion of an existing CAFO confinement. There is no state consideration for doubling or more the number of hogs, which will produce more waste than a small town. Gasses from the huge quantities of manure at CAFOs add to global rapid climate change and include nitrous oxide and methane. Smells from de-composting carcasses at the site have been an issue for area residents.

Carbon Sequestration By Trees

First you need to know that live trees use the process of photosynthesis and absorb carbon dioxide from the air. They then release oxygen that we breathe and retain the carbon to store in the wood of the tree. So we need more trees to take CO2 out of the air and retain it.

Carbon dioxide (CO2) is released when materials that have stored CO2, in a solid form like wood, coal, and oil are burned. The more CO2 that is in the air the more heat is held in the earth's atmosphere. The CO2 acts like a blanket.

A term we need to start hearing more is 'proforestation.' This means protecting and preserving the old growth forests, which are holding CO2. Old growth forests sequester more CO2 in the last 50 years of their lives than they do in their first 50 years. So it is not an even match to cut an old tree and to plant a new tree.

The Tongass National Forest in Alaska has 16 million acres of mature trees and stores about 2 ³/₄ billion tons of carbon. Terrible to say some climate denying legislators have tried for years to increase the logging of the Tongass' old growth forest, in part to make 'soft' toilet paper. Some of these hemlock and cedar trees in the Tongass are 1000 years old and 200 ft tall. Think of all the carbon they are all keeping out of the atmosphere to slow global warming. Just recently President Biden has said, "No more industrial logging of the Tongass will be allowed."

Some trees are better at sequestering CO2 than others. The characteristics that make trees good carbon sinks are: live a long time, grow very large, have a large canopy to aid in photosynthesis, grow quickly, are native trees, are resistant to diseases and

insects, and have a hard dense wood. Deciduous trees meet some of these criteria but need to grow faster. Conifers are usually fast growers but tend to capture much less CO2 than hardwoods. Some of the top trees in our climate region are: Scarlet Oaks, Horse Chestnuts, and Silver Maples.

In summary, old growth forests like Tongass and the Amazon Rain Forest must be immediately protected, many new high quality trees must be planted, and people need to use less wood in their daily lives. Buy non-wood products such as: metal studs for building, mechanical pencils, and bamboo toilet paper.



to the immediate south and to the rare wetland Ernat's Marsh to the west. Both these sites are top-rated Illinois Natural Areas Inventory listed wetlands of importance to the state.

Ninety percent of the wetlands in Illinois have been destroyed. The Army Corps should hold a public hearing to hear local details of the importance of these sites and consider the full economic values of these parks in contrast to the one-time taking of sand leaving a large quarry which will remain a hazard for generations to come and render the current agriculture land at the quarry gone forever.
