



The 2023 legislative session will have serious consequences for Florida's economy, freedom, and environment for years to come. That's why, this year, we give the legislature a failing grade. However, it's undeniable that this session was dominated by one man: **Ron DeSantis**. As a result, the legislature's failure is also the Governor's failure. **Here's what happened**.



Inaction on the environmental crises we face is costly to our people, our economy, and our planet. Limiting the freedoms and financial stability of taxpayers to take action on the environment worsens that cost. Attacks on our freedom like SB 170, a bill designed to stifle local freedom to address local problems, and HB 3, an attack on the freedom to make responsible investing decisions, will promote irresponsible business practices and punish the small businesses that play fair. These efforts contradict the Governor's own "resiliency" plan, lock local governments out of a multi-trillion dollar market that could be used for resiliency projects, and cost taxpayers hundreds of millions of dollars. The Governor's preemptions will limit the types of projects that your community could enact.

On top of this, every single one of these attacks is a blow to Florida's economy. By discouraging responsible investment practices, Ron DeSantis is injecting a great deal of uncertainty into Florida's financial sector and into the retirement funds of firefighters, law enforcement, and teachers. With these attacks on the freedom of local governments, Ron DeSantis is leaving our communities less safe and less clean in a state dependent on tourism, jeopardizing a \$102 billion industry that creates over one and a half million jobs. Without robust action to prevent the backroom fertilizer deal, our coasts will continue to be vulnerable to toxic algae blooms, threatening our health and the millions of jobs reliant on a healthy coastline.

Governor DeSantis has failed to keep Florida free, healthy, and thriving. This legislative session only furthers that failure. He has chosen to serve his own ambitions with political stunts rather than actually governing, and is quickly finding out that his political theater fails on the national stage. Prioritizing special interests and political ambitions over the wellbeing of Floridians only hurts us. America is watching.


REPRESENTATIVE YVONNE HINSON
