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Subject: Majority of Iowa Voters Favors E.P.A.'s Clean Power Plan

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A new Public Policy Polling survey finds that a majority of Iowa voters supports the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's plan to limit the amount of carbon pollution that power plants can release. 60% of Iowans favor the E.P.A.'s Clean Power Plan, while only 36% oppose it. Confidence in the E.P.A.'s direction on the issue is high, with 62% saying they trust the scientists at the E.P.A. more than members of Congress to decide whether there should be limits on air and water pollution. Majorities across a broad range of demographic groups—including women, men, Democrats, Republicans, Independents, young voters, and seniors—are highly receptive to the E.P.A.'s expertise.

Key findings from the survey include:

- The Clean Power Plan is backed by a diverse, broad-based coalition, including majorities of women (67%), men (53%), Democrats (80%), Independents (59%), young voters (57%), and seniors (65%).
- 56% of voters say they would be more likely to vote for a candidate for U.S. Senate from Iowa if he/she supported the Clean Power Plan, including 30% who say they would be much more likely to vote for such a candidate. Just 28% of Iowans say they would be less likely to back a candidate who supported the plan.
- By an overwhelming 64/29 split, Iowans think that the state should be investing more in clean, renewable energy sources like solar and wind instead of traditional sources like coal, oil, and gas.
- Climate change is an increasingly important issue for Iowa voters. 55% have reached the consensus that climate change is a serious problem, with 35% of those saying that it is a "very serious" problem.

PPP interviewed 771 registered Iowa voters from November 5-8. The margin of error for the poll is +/-3.5%. The poll was sponsored by the Sierra Club.
