4. <u>Appointment</u> The Executive Council is charged with the responsibility for confirming or rejecting nominees to councils, boards, commissions and departments. Some appointees, such as Public Utilities Commissioners, Site Evaluation Committee and members of the environmental appeals councils such as the Air Resources Council and the Wetlands
Council, have adjudicative responsibilities. It is important that decision-making authority be exercised fairly and impartially, without bias or the appearance of bias. To date, past legislators, former employees of regulatory agencies and retirees of regulated companies have been confirmed as regulators over entities or industries which previously employed them creating a conflict of interest.

5. Northern Pass Proposed Project

Northern Pass is controversial. Efforts to craft compromise plans have yet to satisfy all who are concerned about the adverse effects of such a large project and Granite Staters question whether the beneficiaries of the project are New Hampshire residents or the residents of the larger states to our south. NHSC opposes the project for three reasons:

- The massive reservoirs in Canada are actually flooded rivers and valleys that were home to native peoples. The flooding has devastated hunting and fishing grounds, as well as sacred sites and villages. The government of Canada plans for new flooding and reservoir construction with the Northern Pass proposal.
- The expected influx of energy will stymic future clean energy development by consuming the investments that would otherwise have gone to local distributed energy, energy efficiency, and weatherization programs.
- Private property owners are not being adequately compensated for the change of use of these 60-80 year old utility easements even though Northern Pass is breaking the terms of the lease by expanding their facilities and using it for international transmission.

6. Natural Gas/Methane

This year Kinder Morgan's controversial proposal for expansion of a natural gas pipeline was withdrawn from the Federal Energy Regulatory Committee. Kinder Morgan's North East Energy Direct pipeline would have gone through 27 communities in the southern quarter of the state using eminent domain. NHSC opposed the expansion for similar reasons as Northern Pass – chilling of the renewable market, property rights and ratepayer expense. Massachusetts has will not allow imposing pipeline costs on consumers while Maine has said it will allow imposing cost on consumers if other states do, too.

7. Commuter Rail

New Hampshire's Executive Council has both approved and opposed funding contracts to propose options for expanded passenger rail between Boston, Mass., and Concord, N.H.

Funding could allow the Bureau of Rail and Transit of the New Hampshire Department of Transportation (NHDOT) to study and operate public transit options along the 78-mile Capitol Corridor, including establishing passenger rail service in the Lowell-Nashua-Manchester portion of the corridor and expanding service to Concord.
