2015 LEGISLATIVE SESSION

Those who shared their overall opinions on the 2015 session all agreed that it was one of the more difficult legislative sessions in Oklahoma history. Whether it was the implementation of new legislative rules, the vast number of Committees, or the lopsided weight within both the House and the Senate, playing politics this session was a hard game. A few champions and a few allies emerged, and a clear consensus in the oil and gas community that profits were a bigger priority than health and safety made the lines fairly clear regarding opponents. We validate that statement by way of noting the passage of SB809 on the last day of session—SB809 repealed Title 52 Part 137 in the State Statutes which until now gave local towns the right to fully regulate the oil and gas industries and related businesses including underground injection operators within their jurisdictional areas. SB809 took away local authority and placed it entirely under the authority of the Oklahoma Corporation Commission, a state government entity—and this action was taken by a wholly conservative legislature which traditionally decries the notion that government should step into take away individual and local rights. That same week saw the same legislators CUT the Oklahoma Corporation Commission's annual budget in spite of the fact they just asked them to take on more work and authority.

Despite the continuing plague of earthquakes in our state, which have been clearly linked to the disposal of record volumes of oil and gas-related byproducts via underground injection wells, not a single bill addressing insurance, health and safety, or other related problems made its way into law this session. The issue of earthquakes helped Oklahoma Sierra Club shape its interests this session, and we will grow and expand our lobby work on this issue going into 2016.

HIGHLIGHTS

From the perspective of environmental politics, it was particularly difficult, but a few moments stand out as positives despite the overall session.

- -Representative Ed Cannaday attempted to introduce legislation (HB1107) that would have introduced statewide setbacks regarding oil and gas drilling in our state, and he followed up this legislation (which died in Committee) with an attempt to amend HB2178 with language that would have made similar setbacks part of state statutes.
- -Representative Corey Williams and Representative Emily Virgin both attempted to amend SB809 with language that would have protected local authority, and specifically called to protect drinking water sources from oil and gas activities. Sadly, both amendments were tabled by Speaker Hickman

-Oklahoma Sierra Club hosted two media events this year at the State Capitol ("Things We Love" and "2015 Lobby Day") which featured numerous political guests including former Attorney General Drew Edmondson, Representative Corey Williams, Representative Emily Virgin, and Mayor Cindy Rosenthal (Norman).

-Oklahoma Sierra Club hosted a Lobby Day attended by dozens of supporters to reach out and visit face to face with Oklahoma Senators and Representatives. We were able to not only share our positions on key bills, but we gathered information to help us establish long-term relationships with Oklahoma's legislators going into 2016.

SUMMARY OF MAJOR LOBBY AREAS

Oklahoma Sierra Club, by way of a Legislative Committee, a full-time lobbyist, and the efforts of hundreds of volunteers, consistently voiced our opinions on a number of bills and issues this session. Via Legislative Alerts, emails, and phone calls, as well as face to face meetings at the Capitol, Oklahoma Sierra Club made sure that Oklahoma's Senators and Legislators were well aware of what we were concerned about and what we believe was best for protecting Oklahoma's air, land, and water.

Oil and Gas Attacks on Local Governments

Numerous bills were aimed at taking away the long-standing rights of cities and towns across Oklahoma to fully regulate oil and gas activities in their communities, and then seeking to penalize them for exercising those rights—and all of these attacks clearly came at the request of oil and gas lobbyists. Sierra Club was the only organization to go on record loudly and publicly that they believe Oklahoma's communities deserve to keep their ability to control what happens in their own backyards, and that seeking to place monetary penalties on cities and towns for working to safeguard their citizens was just plain wrong. We came out 50/50 on these battles, with SB809 passing and SB468 failing—cities lost the right to fully ban activities related to oil and gas and injection well operations, but local governments were not burdened with financial penalties for trying to enact ordinances related to oil and gas in their cities and towns.

Farm and Ranch—the Good and the Bad

Many bills focused on so-called "farm and ranch" issues, but were in effect nothing more than attempts to insulate large corporate farms and ranches from having to live by the rules that other Oklahomans live by. The Oklahoma Farm Bureau once again requested legislation that both directly and indirectly works to lower the thresholds of various rules and regulations that are in place to keep Oklahoma's air, land, and water safe and clean. For example, HB1514 changed the rules regarding Confined Animal Feeding Operations in the state—and in ways that make it better for corporations and

worse for neighbors and the environment. And worst of all, the passage of HJR1012, which will now call for a vote of the people to "protect Oklahoma farmers and ranchers" with a constitutional amendment—what they did not say, was that this bill was requested by large corporations and ALEC¹ who used the Oklahoma Farm Bureau as a mouthpiece to set the stage for potentially completely insulating these large corporate interests from laws and lawsuits no matter what these corporations want to do. This is like giving a free pass to pollute.

One bill that drew our attention, and got us excited, was SB571 which would have exempted roadside garden stands and farmers market sales from having to pay sales tax. Unfortunately this bill failed deadline, and died. It is important to point this bill out, because while the Oklahoma Legislature bends over backwards to cut taxes for the most profitable companies in our state more and more taxes (oil and gas companies continue to see major profits every quarter), they could not muster the energy to pass a single bill that would have aided Oklahoma's TRUE small farmers and ranchers. In short, the Oklahoma legislature continued its trend towards aiding mega-farms and mega-ranches while not lifting a finger to help the small mom and pop operations across Oklahoma.

Wind Energy

One of the most difficult areas to navigate this session was the great number of bills aimed at the wind energy industry. We opposed all of these bills for the majority of the session, holding firm to our position that the Oklahoma legislature was unfairly targeting the wind energy sector in ways that it did not even consider for other energy sectors such as oil and gas. Rather than praise the fact that Oklahoma wind energy is a steadily growing industry creating jobs and producing taxes across many counties in Oklahoma (and making Oklahoma 4th in the entire nation in the production of wind energy), the legislature seemed intent on killing business by placing onerous new regulations and stripping away all of the financial incentives in place—incentives, by the way, much smaller by far than what the oil and gas industries cost Oklahoma every year. However, towards the close of session, wind energy companies agreed to a series of new regulations and dropped some financial incentives to show they were willing to meet politicians half way and be good stewards. We expect this issue to be back in our headlights in 2016.

The Positives

While the bad outweighed the good overall, there were a few bright moments to highlight from this session.

¹ ALEC: The American Legislative Exchange Council is a national organization composed of corporate lobbyists and state legislators who craft 'model legislation' that benefits corporations at public expense. These model bills are then taken back to individual states where the legislation is introduced by member legislators, but legislation is claimed to be done by the individual legislator, NOT by ALEC. ALEC is a pay-to-play operation where corporations buy a seat and a vote on 'task forces' to advance their legislative wish lists, and ultra-conservative state legislators round out the task force memberships.

Passenger Rail: HB1077 would have made a step in the right direction towards improving and expanding Oklahoma's passenger rail development. It was a "no cost" bill which would have simply required ODOT to start reporting on items it should have been reporting on all along via the "Oklahoma Passenger Rail Improvement Act" passed many years ago. But due to "procedural errors," this bill died. We hope to see an effort similar to this bill in 2016.

Water Conservation: SB760 is an example of what all Oklahomans should be on the lookout for as you become involved in following politics and legislation—the proverbial "wolf in sheep's clothing." This bill had the innocuous name of being the "Oklahoma Water Use Working Group" bill. However, its true purpose was to seek ways to transfer water out of other parts of Oklahoma and into west Oklahoma—interbasin transfers for short. Happily, this bill failed deadline and died. Oklahoma Sierra Club wrote a paper on this issue previously, and we helped defeat efforts to carry out political actions along these lines. The idea is "robbing Peter to pay Paul," and does nothing to actually solve Oklahoma's water woes in the long run.

The Pollinator Protection Plan: SB229 was signed into law, and it calls for the formation of a Pollinator Protection Plan to protect some of our smallest allies—the pollinators. Bees and butterflies are responsible for pollinating most of our food and flowers, and so any effort to protect those rates highly on our radar. We do note with caution, however, that this planning process needs to be followed carefully by us and our members to assure that the plan is not merely an attempt to avoid having to enact federal standards of protection for pollinators in the future—just recently the President announced he intends to do just that at the federal level to assure our tiniest workers do not continue to face colony collapse and population tragedies.

GRASSROOTS EFFORTS

THE LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEE

Oklahoma Sierra Club has a chapter-level Legislative Committee to help wade through the countless bills, to help focus where the most attention is needed, and to help with the non-stop outreach efforts needed throughout session as well as to help make specific events the best that they can be.

THE ACTUAL GRASS ROOTS—OUR MEMBERS

The Legislative Committee works to reach all of our members who have indicated an interest and a willingness to help out with specific needs during legislative session—whether it is a phone call, a letter, an editorial, or directly meeting with legislators, our members are the backbone of our work. This session, we issued numerous Legislative Alerts, sent emails on high-priority Committee actions, and invitations for our media events and Lobby Day—our members responded, and we logged hundreds of direct legislative contacts between our members and their legislators.

LEGISLATIVE SCORECARDS

The scorecards are based on selected bills chosen from among our priority issues and taken together provide a strong composite representation of each legislators relationship to environmental issues in our state. The following are summaries of the specific bills selected. Please note—the representatives have two votes not listed under the senators. These two votes represent attempted amendments to SB809, and they are listed below:

SB809: [Sen. Bingman (R-Sapulpa); Rep. Hickman (R-Fairview)] This bill repealed O.S. 52 Section 137 which for the past 80 years gave municipal authorities the right to regulate all aspects of the oil and gas industry and wastewater injection industry in their jurisdictions, up to and including approving prohibitions or bans on certain oil, gas and injection activity. This bill now gives the Oklahoma Corporation Commission "exclusive jurisdiction" over these matters.

- -Oklahoma Sierra Club opposed this bill.
- -The bill was signed into law by Governor Mary Fallin on May 29th, 2015.

SB809 Williams Amendment: Representative Corey Williams attempted to amend SB809 by adding language that would have removed the repeal of O.S. 52 Section 137 from the bill—Speaker of the House Hickman called to table the amendment, and did so successfully with the votes noted.

SB809 Virgin Amendment: Representative Emily Virgin attempted to amend SB809 by adding language that would have required groundwater protection measures to be included in the bill—Speaker of the House Hickman called to table the amendment, and did so successfully with the votes noted.

HJR1012: [Sen. Smalley (R-Stroud); Rep. Biggs (R-Chickasha)] This bill calls for a vote of the people in 2016 to amend the Oklahoma Constitution with an amendment that would prevent the Oklahoma legislature from passing any laws that impinge on "farming and ranching practices" in Oklahoma. This bill places no limits on what can be excluded, thus creating a very dangerous opportunity to insulate corporations involved in farming and ranching from being held accountable for pollution, side effects of confined animal feeding operations, and various other issues that have a strong potential to affect neighbors, the public, and Oklahoma's natural resources in harmful ways.

- -Oklahoma Sierra Club opposed this bill.
- -This Resolution was signed and filed with the Oklahoma Secretary of State on April 30th, 2015.

SB676: [Sen. Bingman (R-Sapulpa); Rep. Hickman (R-Fairview)] This bill would have required the Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) to submit any state implementation plan required under Section 111(d) of the Federal Clean Air Act to both the Legislature and the Oklahoma Attorney General for official approval before DEQ would be allowed to submit any such plan to the EPA. This bill would place roadblocks and additional bureaucracy between Oklahoma citizens and their right to clean air.

- -Oklahoma Sierra Club opposed this bill.
- -This Bill was vetoed by Governor Mary Fallin on May 1st, 2015.

SB438: [Sen. Sparks (D-Norman); Rep. Virgin (D-Norman)] This bill gives cities and towns larger than 10,000 people, and that have general fund expenditures greater than \$10,000,000, the right to enact and enforce comprehensive codes of campaign finance and personal financial disclosure ordinances in regards to local elections. As a strong proponent of democracy, Oklahoma Sierra Club believes this bill will help level the playing field in community politics.

- -Oklahoma Sierra Club supported this bill.
- -This Bill was signed into law by Governor Mary Fallin on May 20th, 2015.

SB468: [Sen. Marlatt (R-Woodward); Rep. Calvey (R-OKC)] This bill would have placed financial penalties on any community or town government that enacted oil and gas ordinances which affected the execution of mineral rights for any lease or deed within the city limits of the community or town—it would have established what is known as a "takings principle." This bill would have served as a financial threat to any community trying to do the right thing by enacting limits on oil and gas activities that they feel might be needed to protect their citizens.

- -Oklahoma Sierra Club opposed this bill.
- -This Bill failed to meet legislative deadlines on May 22nd, 2015, and was declared dead.
